#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

#### Introduction

The Lagos State Security Trust Fund was established by Law of the Lagos State House of Assembly in September 2007, based on the recommendations of a high powered security committee set up by His Excellency, Babatunde Fashola, SAN (in the early days of his administration) and headed by former Inspector General of Police, Alhaji Musiliu Smith.

The Fund was a practical response to the reality of the operational deficiency of the police and other federal security agencies within the state, due to long years of neglect by the federal government, particularly in areas of funding and provision of modern equipment. The Fund is essentially a public-private partnership in response to the challenges of security. In realization that the huge demands of security can no longer be met by government alone.

#### **Board of Trustees**

The Board of Trustees of the Fund was inaugurated by His Excellency, Babatunde Fashola, SAN, on 7 November 2007. The Board has representation from the private and public sectors, as well as the civil society.

The Fund is managed by the Executive Secretary/Chief Executive, Fola Arthur-Worrey, former Solicitor General/Permanent Secretary and former Commissioner for Lands.

#### Objectives

The objectives of the Fund, as contained in the Law establishing it, are to raise money through voluntary donations from government agencies, private organisations and individuals. The money thus raised is to be used for the acquisition and deployment of security equipment and such human, material and financial resources as shall be found necessary for the effective functioning of all Federal, State and Local Government and other security agencies operating in the state.

Part of the funds shall also be reserved for the training and retraining of security personnel. As of today one of the primary responsibilities of the Fund is the provision of operational and logistic support for the Rapid Response Squad (RRS).

#### **Fund Raising Strategy**

Since coming into office the Lagos State Governor has held two (2) Town Hall Meetings on security with the organised private sector and private citizens. The first meeting was an advocacy and fund raising drive, while the second was mainly to give account of donations received and solicit for more funds. In addition, the Board of Trustees of the Fund is currently working on the following strategies:

 Advocacy visits to companies/organizations by members of the Board of Trustees of the Fund. This commenced in October 2008.

- An e-funding model which will afford donors irrespective of location to contribute to the fund via the internet/ATMs. The modalities of its operation are currently being worked out.
- The Fund is also working on requesting the public to donate via text messages on their phones.

#### The story so far

In response to the 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> Town Hall Meetings on security, many stakeholders supported the objectives of the Fund to improve the security situation in Lagos State through their donations in cash and kind valued at about N4.46 billion as at 31 December 2008 as shown in the financial statements. Between 1 January 2009 and 31 August 2009, the Fund has received contributions in cash and kind, valued at N261 million.

Donations received during the period under review have been disclosed in the statement of revenues and expenses and the related notes to the financial report. Donations received after December 2008 include:

The Fund's expenditure from inception to 31 December 2008 is as contained in the financial statements. Some of the approved expenditure of the Fund between January and August 2009 include:

- Provision of communication equipment (masts, repeater stations, base radios and walkie talkies) for the SSS
- Expansion of the police communication network to include Ibeju Lekki, Epe, Ikorodu axis of the state
- Provision of night vision goggles binoculars, and searchlights for the Marine Police and Navy

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- Provision of floatable bulletproof vests for the Marine Police and Police Anti-Terrorist Squad
- Provision of additional operational vehicles and ballistic gear for the RRS, Army, Navy, Air force, SSS, Anti Terrorist Squad, MOPOL 49, AIG Zone 2, several divisional Police installations within the state and the Lagos State Police Command amongst others

Maintenance of assets, a vital component of the whole management structure, has also featured significantly in the overall expenditure profile of the Fund.

As at 1 September 2009, the Fund has a balance of N175.9 million in its bank accounts (less outstanding commitments).

#### The Fund's argument

Recent statistics from the Police and independent sources show that crime rate in Lagos State is continuously declining, due substantially to the efforts of the Lagos State Police Command with the support of Lagos State Security Trust Fund. One of the advantages of the Fund is its ability to respond quickly to security challenges as it is not handicapped by bureaucracy or formal budget cycles. For instance, the Fund was able to infuse 5 additional fully equipped patrol vans into OP MESA (joint Military/Navy/Air force patrols) within three days of request to check the sudden increase in the incidence of armed robberies in the Ojo/Igando axis of the state. However because of the cost and unending demands of maintaining law and order, the challenge of the Fund is sustainability. The Fund has been able to raise a substantial amount of money and assets (in relative terms in the circumstances) since its inception, but the task of fighting crime is very far from accomplished. There are still major challenges in effectively policing parts of the city and in responding to distress calls in time to prevent incidents.

At the 2<sup>nd</sup> Town Hall Meeting on Security the Commissioner of Police, Lagos State, in his presentation, admitted that Lagos State, through the Fund, has tremendously increased the operational capacity of the Police Force which has translated to improved security in the State. He noted that the state being a coastal state, a border state, a riverine state and the economic and social epicenter of the West African sub-region, with its huge residential and migrant population, faces enormous challenges in security and infrastructure. He stressed that a lot is still required to move the state to the next level in terms of security so that business and social life can continue to flourish. These include:

- Installation of CCTV cameras for surveillance
- Illumination of all streets within the state to remove the cover used by miscreants to propagate crimes
- Provision of bulletproof patrol boats to effectively patrol the waterways
- Provision of motorcycles, which provide maneuvering ability to combat street crimes/robberies
- Establishment of viable state-wide communication networks
- Purchase of helicopters for aerial patrols
- Provision of sophisticated weapons to match those used by the criminals/robbers

It is important to note that a substantial part of the donations to the Fund have been from the banking and telecommunications sectors, though it must be stressed that quite a number of organisations in this category have still not responded to the Fund's advocacy. While there has been some support from the oil marketing firms, majority of the oil marketers have not contributed to the Fund. Also only few of the retail companies, whose activities are responsible for a deluge of street traders in most areas of the state and fast foods outlets whose activities attract a convergence of people at various fun spots all over the city, contribute substantially to the challenges of policing the state and who therefore are morally bound to support the initiative, have contributed to the Fund.

The Fund appreciates the support and donations of individuals, companies and organisations who have contributed in both cash and kind to this initiative. The Fund relies on a strong public-private partnership to achieve its objectives. # REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITORS TO THE TRUSTEES OF LAGOS STATE SECURITY TRUST FUND

#### Report on the financial statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Lagos State Security Trust Fund (the Fund) which comprise the balance sheet as of 31 December 2008 and the statement of revenues and expenses and statement of cash flows for the 17 months period then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.

Trustees' responsibility for the financial statements

The Trustees are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the Nigerian Statements of Accounting Standards and the requirements of the Lagos State Security Trust Fund Law. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

#### Auditor's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates, if any, made by the trustees, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### (a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements are prepared on a modified cash basis under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable standards.

### (b) Revenue recognition

Cash donations are recognised as revenue when cash is received or when pledges are certain to be redeemed.

Donations in kind are valued at market value or reasonable estimates.

#### (c) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are shown at acquisition cost less accumulated depreciation. Acquisition cost represents the purchase price of the item plus freight, insurance and handling charges, or the fair market value for donated items.

### (d) Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated on the straight line method to write off the cost of each asset to their residual values over their estimated useful lives, at the following annual rates:

#### (e) Expenses

All expenses are accounted for when incurred or obligated, whether or not cash has been paid, and have been classified under headings that aggregate all costs of similar nature. Expenditure is recognised:

- when goods or services are received
- when cash is paid in advance to project contractors

#### (f) Investments

Investments comprise term deposits placed with banks and are stated at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

#### (g) Inventories

Inventories consist of items received from donors, not yet distributed to approved security agencies.

#### 1 The Fund

The objectives of the Trust Fund are to raise money through voluntary subscriptions and donations from all interested Government agencies, private organizations and individuals. The money thus raised is to be used for the acquisition and deployment of security equipment and such human, material and financial resources as shall be found necessary for the effective functioning of all Federal, State and Local Government and other security agencies operating in the state and part of the fund shall be reserved for the training and retraining of the security personnel.
