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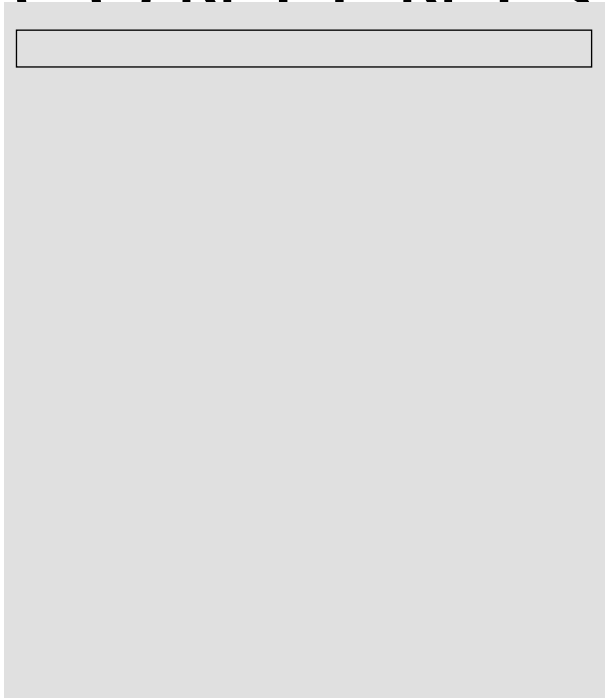

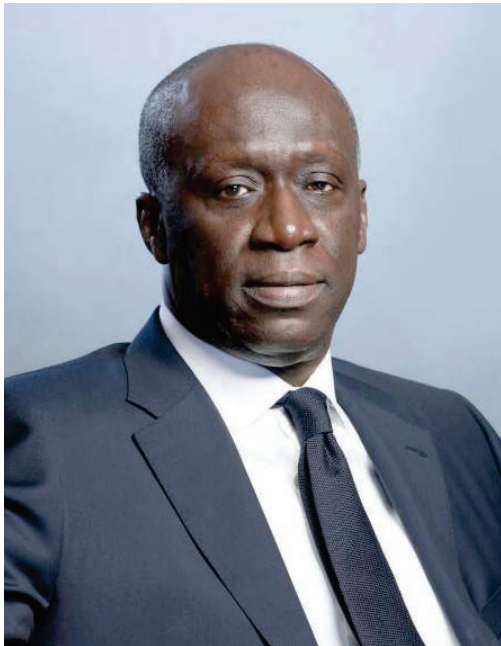

CHAIRMAN'S WELCOME ADDRESS AT THE 12 TH TOWN HALL MEETING ON SECURITY WITH THE GOVERNOR



Your Excellency, Distinguished Ladies and Gentlemen, I welcome you all to the 12th edition of the Lagos State Security Trust Fund's Annual Town Hall Meeting on Security with the Governor, His Excellency, Mr. Akinwunmi Ambode.

It is another period of evaluation and reappraisal of our collective efforts towards making Lagos the most secure and most prosperous commercial destination in Africa and our Theme for today's event is: **"Security in Lagos State; Progress and Challenges"**.

As customary, the Executive Secretary would give a report on the details of the activities of the Fund within the last year, particularly in respect of our mandate to provide operational capacity and logistics for the police and other security agencies in the State.

Also, the Commissioner of Police would give a brief report on the security situation in the State including challenges and strategies deployed to mitigate them. His Excellency, the Governor shall address this gathering on the policy thrust of the State Government in response to the security challenges in the State.

Please recall that about a year ago when we gathered together at the 11th edition of this meeting, a few issues were brought to the fore regarding the

development of a sustainable security policy and a number of attendees made suggestions on the way forward for a secured Lagos. In the spirit of the sentiments expressed at that meeting, His Excellency made a pronouncement that a Security Summit will be organized to review the security challenges in the State with the objective of proffering a road map to a sustainable security infrastructure in the State. Consequently, the Lagos State Security Summit held on the 9th April 2018 at the Eko Hotels and Suits. The report of that summit will be formally presented to His Excellency today.

I wish to state that today's event has been packaged to be more interactive, with the consciousness of time on our minds, as we intend to conclude this event in two and a half hours. Therefore, we shall commence with the receipt and acknowledgments of donations and pledges from now till the end of the event.

The Lagos State Security Trust Fund was birthed as a child of necessity some 11 years ago and ever since, the Fund has been able to transform the security of Lagos State from a very dangerous position to the safest State in Nigeria today. We are not unmindful that the State has not reached its goal, but we have come a long way from where we started. Together with our worthy partners, the general perception of residents of Lagos is that the State is more peaceful and secure as a result of the Fund's intervention.

It is pertinent for me to thank our partners -a special mention of Mr. Jim Ovia, who has been a pillar of our success so far- your persistence in keeping faith with the goals of the Fund has made it possible for 21 million residents to carry on their activities, social or economic, in relative peace and tranquility. We are indeed very grateful.

The three years I have spent on the Board of the Fund as Chairman, has made me greatly appreciate the security challenges in the State and the huge sacrifices of our security personnel in ensuring that the rest of us can go about our businesses with little fear even with the meager resources at their disposal. I want to seize this opportunity to thank the Commissioner of Police, CP Imohimi Edgal, men of the Police Force and others security agencies operating in the State for their noble services.

To my fellow members on the Board of Trustees who have equally contributed a lot of their time in deliberations on the ways to achieve the objectives of the Fund, especially when we consider the opportunity cost of their time, I say a deep-seated thank you for your services to the State and fellow residents.

It is a well acknowledged fact that in the last three and half years, His Excellency, Mr. Akinwunmi Ambode has demonstrated total commitment to the protection of lives and property in the State. Therefore, I say with all sense of responsibility that His Excellency's passion for the safety and security of Lagosians remains second to none. We are sincerely grateful for your steadfastness in this regard.

I would like to remind you all, as I have always done, that the Fund is the institutional vehicle through which private and corporate organizations, individuals, social, professional and religious associations, the local governments/local council development areas and the Lagos State Government, provides significant number of assets for the police and other security agencies in the State.

Be assured that the Fund will continue to play a significant role in our collective wellbeing, to the extent that it remains the most significant institution partnering with the police and other agencies to enable them, within their all too obvious constraints carry out their mandate to preserve law and order.

Till date, the Fund and the Lagos State Government account for over Eighty-Five percent (85%) of the equipment in use by security agencies in Lagos State. This implies that without the Fund, Lagos would have been an unsafe place to live. The fact that many States and even the Federal Government are replicating Trust Funds is a clear indication that there is still no alternative to this resourcing model. We must uphold it because it will play a pertinent role in defining our future as a State.

Funding is a critical factor in security and we cannot shy away from it as failure to provide resources for our security agencies threatens the very fabric of our existence.

In fact, experts and corporate entities at the Lagos State Security Summit called for the introduction of a security levy so that funding can be guaranteed for the implementation of the resolutions of the summit. This is a strategy the Fund has been reluctant to adopt though it was provided for in the Law establishing it in 2007. The argument of these experts follows the fact that in other climes, say Dubai for example, when you are charged \$200 for a hotel room, about five different charges including a security tax are included in your bill apart from the room rate. However, in Lagos, people spend a lot of money on parties every weekend (from Thursday to Sunday) but little or no money is voted by the organizers for the police who are the last resort should there be any serious security breach.

Your Excellency, Ladies and Gentlemen, it is in our collective interests that we continue to contribute to the Fund in the spirit of Corporate Social Responsibility in order to improve security in Lagos and specifically, the implementation of the road map established at the Lagos State Security Summit for our safety and security in the State from now till 2030.

In anticipation of your generous contributions to this worthy cause, I thank you once again for your attendance.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY/CEO OF THE LAGOS STATE SECURITY TRUST FUND AT THE 12TH TOWN HALL MEETING ON SECURITY WITH THE GOVERNOR



Introduction

Lagos State, a cosmopolitan city which is the commercial center of Nigeria and perhaps Africa, has a population of over 21 million and attaining the status of a mega city. It is the one of the smallest states in the country with a land mass of 3,577 km² yet in this space, Lagos is home to the largest sea and air ports in the country, having the headquarters of most corporate organizations from all sectors of the economy situated in it. It is the 5th largest economy in Africa and as expected has its share of security challenges associated with a mega city. These challenges are further complicated by the huge and continuous migration into the state, creating a diversity that not only makes Lagos the envy of other states but also a complicated state to manage.

By 2007, the overwhelming security challenges prompted the State government to seek the recommendations of a committee of notable stakeholders from the private and public sector on how to improve security in the state. Their recommendations eventually led to the establishment of the Lagos State Security Trust Fund by a law of the Lagos State House of Assembly. The state and other concerned citizens (corporate and individuals) came together under the Fund to contribute resources for the provision of operational capacity and training of the police and other security agencies operating in Lagos.

Since its inception to date, the Fund has continued to attract resources from donors both in cash and kind to equip security agencies in furtherance of its objective of improving security in the state. LSSTF provides quick interventions for the Lagos State Police Command and

its formations in the State particularly the Rapid Response Squad. The Fund also extends its interventions to the Lagos Neighborhood Safety Corps, Department of State Services, the Nigerian Prison Service, Federal Road Safety Corps, OP MESA (comprising of Army, Navy and Air Force), Operation Awatse, Nigeria Security and Civil Defense Corps (NSCDC), Nigerian Customs Service, National Drug Law Enforcement Agency, etc.

As we go through the issues of the day, I plead that everyone should bear in mind that while Security is the exclusive remit of the Federal Government, the State, under the Public Private Partnership model, had to take up a critical part of this responsibility for the protection of Lagos residents and the future of our children.

Operations of the Fund

The operating philosophy of the LSSTF is to improve general security in the state. This is in line with our Vision which is: "LAGOS - THE SAFEST, MOST SECURE AND MOST PROSPEROUS COMMERCIAL LOCATION IN AFRICA"; and our Mission Statement which is: "FACILITATING SAFETY AND SECURITY IN LAGOS STATE". Therefore, every request from security agencies MUST be intended to provide general security for it to be considered by the Fund with a view to attaining our vision.

The activities and functions of the Fund have grown over the years thereby necessitating constant review of its operational structure for more efficiency and effectiveness. Permit me to state that stemming from our current realities there is a compelling need to review and amend, where necessary, the Law establishing the Fund to make it more adaptable to present day needs as some of its provisions which were created and passed some 11 years ago, did not envisage existing challenges.

At the level of the Lagos State Security Council, the Fund as a member, works closely with the state Government and the Security agencies to strategize and implement the security goals of the state.

The Fund operates through a Board of Trustees which is autonomous and receives no subvention from the state government. In order to be effective, the Fund carries out its responsibility by direct assessment of requests from security agencies. These agencies are invited to meet with the Board to expatiate on their requests to the extent that it will improve general security and state clear outcomes by which to measure the interventions by the Fund.

The Fund has a minimal staff strength and keeps its operations simple with emphasis on a low operating cost structure.

The Fund's accounts are audited by internationally recognized external auditors. Ernst and Young who are the current external auditors to the Fund shall be presenting the Fund's audited financial statements for 2017. PricewaterhouseCoppers carried out the first six annual audits.

In compliance with its duty of accounting to the public on its activities, the LSSTF organizes yearly Town Hall meetings on Security with the Governor, such as we are doing today, and as the Chairman had stated earlier, this event, which is hosted by the Governor, is primarily to render an account of its stewardship, present its audit report and solicit for more donations to the Fund. In addition, it provides an avenue for the Governor to share his ideas on security and get feedback, while the Commissioner of Police presents the security report of the state to the public. Also, other relevant activities such as the presentation of the Security Summit Report which is included in today's programme are done at these meetings.

The Fund provides accountability for all donations and intervenes in critical areas that ensure the effectiveness of the security infrastructure in the state. I must stress here that the role of the Fund does not stop at merely purchasing of equipment but more critically as in the case of the RRS, it ensures that their equipment is duly serviced, repaired and replaced as appropriate. It also provides training and retraining including health and other welfare packages amongst others for security personnel in general.

The role of Security operatives

Security operatives in the state have the statutory duty of protection of lives and property whether corporate or individual and they put themselves in arms way in doing so, often paying the ultimate price without the knowledge of those they protect. In 2018 we lost 2 officers in line of duty. Although nothing can be compared to the life of a loved one, the Lagos State Government has encapsulated its gratitude to these men and women with a life assurance policy of Ten Million Naira (₦10,000,000.00). This does not exist in any other state in Nigeria.

Working closely with these security operatives, I have come to understand the difficult work environment in which they strive to carry out their duties even when a

few bad eggs seem to dominate the public perception of these fine officers and attract adverse reactions. Despite this, our security operatives have continued to display great courage and dedication to duty and I salute their courage. Please accept the gratitude of the good people of Lagos State for what you do and do not relent but persevere as the good you do will eventually outshine the ugly public perception.

Also, I have heard a lot of talk about how efficient security agencies are abroad and I want to remind those who make this assertion that behind every successful venture is a system that works. If a police officer in Nigeria is assured of the basic necessities, equipment, good emolument, adequate training and more importantly that his/her family will be well taken care of in the event of the unexpected, I am sure he/she would give their all and carry out thorough investigations no matter where it leads.

Donations – Strategies, Application, Progress and Challenges

The Fund is principally in the business of fundraising as its ability to provide operational capacity for the police and other security agencies depend on resources from voluntary donations by organizations and well-meaning individuals. In achieving this, the Fund has adopted the following Strategies geared towards fundraising;

- Advocacy letters
- Fundraising dinners with the Governor as host
- Town Hall meetings on security with the Governor
- One on one advocacy/ follow up visits/courtesy visits
- Organizing mini Town Hall Meetings with some sectors of the economy including; Tourism, Education, Resident Associations, LGAs/LCDAs, Trade/Market Associations, etc.
- Establishing the Remita online payment platform on the LSSTF website
- Collaboration with MTN to provide a platform where subscribers on the MTN network can send "Help" to 9999 and donate ₦50 (the Fund is currently working with other Telecommunication companies to achieve same).
- Gradual engagement of individuals in the social media space targeting retail donations
- Advertisements

These methods however have not yielded the desired results as the response from corporate organizations and individuals have been quite dismal considering the large population of the state and the fact that over 40% of organizations in Nigeria have their headquarters situated in Lagos state.

In 11 years, the Fund has raised a combined sum of Twenty-Two Billion and Eight Million Naira

(₦22,800,000.00) in cash and kind which has translated to 1,174 vehicles, 45 Armored Personnel Carriers, 579 motorbikes, 21 police patrol boats, 2854 tyres, 800 batteries, 127 power generating sets of various capacities (250KVA, 200KVA, 100KVA, 160KVA, 60KVA and 5 KVA), 2,164 bulletproof vests, 5,196 rain gears (coats and boots), 1,750 sweaters, 1000 riders' gear, Five Billion Seven Million Naira (₦5,700,000,000.00) in fuel costs (petrol and diesel). Over Four Hundred and Fifty Million Naira (₦450,000,000.00) in maintenance (repairs, routine service and refurbishment) of the fleet of security vehicles, Three Hundred and Eleven Million Naira (₦311,000,000.00) on security building (acquisition/building and renovations), Eighty-Five Million Naira (₦85,000,000.00) on training of various types amongst many others.

From the last Town Hall Meeting on Security with the Governor held in the Governors' Office on 13th December 2017 to 15th November 2018, the Fund received a total of Five Hundred and Seventeen Million Five Hundred and Twenty-Six Thousand Naira (₦517,526,000.00) and expended a total of Three Hundred and Thirty Million Two Hundred and Sixty-One Thousand Two Hundred and Ninety Naira Forty-Seven Kobo (₦330,261,290.47) on interventions for security agencies. To be specific, the Fund provided nine (4 X 4) patrol vehicles, 109 digital base radios, 100 digital walkie talkies, 200 rain coats with boots, 252 tyres, 246 batteries, one 100KVA generator, 1 fully fitted ambulance, including training courses. This has been one of the lowest amounts the Fund has raised since its inception in a time when the security challenges have increased with also a huge increase in the cost of these equipment.

In addition to the provision of equipment and training for security agencies operating in the state, all RRS vehicles including their Armored Personnel Carriers have completed 3 service cycles while the fleet of Marine police boats have completed its quarterly servicing for the year 2018. Regular repairs were also carried out on the RRS and the Marine Police fleets as required. Also, based on request, the repair and maintenance of patrol vehicles of other security agencies were carried out by the Fund in 2018. The Fund spent a total of Fifty Million Three Hundred and Eight Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty Naira Forty-Seven Kobo (₦50,308,940.47) since the last Town Hall meeting on service/repairs/refurbishment of equipment in use by security agencies.

Furthermore, we wish to inform you that the fleet of the Marine Police Patrol Boats has increased from 18 serviceable boats to 34 serviceable boats under this administration as a direct response to the security challenges and criminal activities perpetuated by armed bandits via the waterways in 2015 when this administration assumed office. It should be noted that the marine police unit still requires at least 20 more patrol boats to efficiently cover the waterways.

In a few minutes you will hear from the Commissioner of Police, Lagos State Police Command, how our collective efforts through the Fund has achieved the following in Lagos State:

- Significant reduction in violent crime and other criminally-related activities in recent years
- No bank robberies
- Huge reduction in kidnapping
- No more attacks through waterways
- Heightened security awareness
- The only well-established emergency Call Centre in Nigeria with 112 and 767 toll free lines
- Increased use of the emergency response lines
- Enhanced crime-prevention and response capability
- Crack down on insurgency/terrorism.

I make bold to add that LSSTF is an accountable Trust Fund that has successfully carried out its mandate, making it a shining example for other states in Nigeria. Indeed, several states have copied our model and the Federal Government currently has a bill in the National Assembly to establish same.

As much as we are very grateful to our donors, especially those that have been with us in the past 12 years, there is a lot more to be done. While the police are trying to handle traditional crimes like home invasions, car jerking, armed robberies etc., they also have to deal with Cybercrimes, kidnapping, terrorism and gang wars with their varying technical requirement. That security is an expensive venture cannot be overemphasized and we must not lose sight of the fact that a good number of these equipment especially the ones provided in the early years of the Fund are no longer in use as they have run out of useful life due to wear and tear. For instance, only about 400 of the patrol vehicles we have provided over the years are still economically viable and with a Toyota Hilux costing Twenty Million Naira (₦20,000,000.00) per unit with accessories, replacing 600 vehicles would cost Twelve Billion Naira! (₦12,000,000,000.00) This cost has not yet taken routine maintenance, repairs and fueling into consideration.

As you all know the US recently experienced a serious security breach when makeshift bombs were sent via mail to some notable individuals. What struck me in the whole saga was the preparedness of the security agencies. They had various kinds of robots, suits and even vehicles to carry the bomb to a safe place. Apart from the fact that these equipment were purchased long before they were required, they were very

expensive. Bomb disposal robots cost between Ten Thousand US Dollar (\$10,000.00) and One Hundred Thousand US Dollar (\$100,000.00) (₦3.6 Million to ₦36 Million) depending on capabilities, while EOD 9 bomb suit cost about Twenty-Eight Thousand US Dollar (\$28,000.00) (₦10.08 Million) while its helmet cost another Fifteen Thousand US Dollar (\$15,000.00) (₦5.4 Million). Please note that other African cities like Cairo and Johannesburg have these equipment as we speak. A mega city like Lagos State must be adequately equipped with technologies such as Long Range Acoustic Devices, Bomb Detectors, Water Canons, Non-Lethal Weapons, Anti-Riot equipment, Rapid Deployment Barriers (to mention a few), in order to contain civil unrest and other life-threatening situations without resulting to life ammunition. Therefore if we really want to be prepared we need to raise good money to do so.

We have continued to train security personnel on ways of handling our equipment and on how to discharge their duties with civility but as you must agree with me, these are major challenges in our country which we are committed to addressing in Lagos.

With a population of over 21 million people and probably an estimated 23 thousand police officers on active duty, which is a ratio of 840:1, we are far above the world accepted ratio of 450:1. It is evident that we do not have enough men to do the job and so we must turn to technology. One of the outcomes of our security summit is that businesses (particularly corporate offices) need to invest in CCTV cameras to complement those already deployed by the state. If several offices on a street install CCTV cameras (according to specified standards), these cameras can be integrated into the state government's system and used in tracking the activities of criminals.

Another outcome from the 2018 Summit was the integration of Private Security Guards in the security architecture of the State. It was noted that by registering these operatives and setting up a Standard Operating Policy for their operations, they can complement the state's security apparatus.

It is also pertinent that we realize that as much as our government is doing its best to keep us safe, we have a role to play in our security as well. For instance, the Fund in conjunction with the Lagos State Police Command and the State Security Service has always encouraged residents to ensure that their domestic staff are properly vetted and registered with the police. This is another issue that came up at the Security Summit because of the increasing cases of robberies, kidnappings and murders involving domestic staff. We admit that this may not be a foolproof strategy but it will greatly reduce the risk. In fact private security agencies can also assist in carrying out domestic staff vetting.

For more insight into the outcomes of the Lagos State Security Summit, the Chairman of the Organizing Committee would be addressing us just before the presentation of the report and I advise that you listen attentively to his Executive Summary on the Summit for the actions that will be implemented by the Lagos State Government for the enhancement of security in the state going forward. His address is included in the brochure already in your possession. I also expect the Commissioner of Police to further state some of the challenges of the Police in the state.

From the forgoing it is important to let you know that with over 11 years' experience and a clear roadmap from the Lagos State Security Summit, we know what to do and we have a plan to achieve it.

However, the crucial component to our collective success is funding and as it stands the few regular donors who have shouldered the responsibility of keeping us all safe in the past 11 years are beginning to get fatigued from this huge responsibility, therefore we strongly urge other corporate organizations and well-meaning individuals to contribute their quota towards this worthy endeavor.

Conclusion

While it is important for us to recognize how far we have come particularly for those who did not think it was possible, we should focus on the future. In one of our earlier Town Hall Meetings on Security, it was established that Lagos State has 9000 roads which needs to be secured. A fusion of men and technology has been proposed to accomplish this and both are expensive. We must realize that as much as we desire prosperity there is need to make sacrifices. These sacrifices need to be planned for and committed to as the alternative for not acting now may be harrowing for some, devastating to others or even a dream cut short if we fall victims of crimes we could have prevented by making donations to the Fund.

Let us not be complacent but live up our responsibility to provide a safe and secure environment for our children and for our businesses to thrive or we might end up gathering together now and again only to console ourselves after the evil doers have had their way.

Distinguished Ladies and gentlemen, I urge you to play your part in building a safe and secure Lagos by committing to making regular donations to the Fund to establish the security infrastructure we require to make all of us prosperous.

**A REPORT ON THE ACTIVITIES OF THE LAGOS STATE POLICE COMMAND
FROM NOVEMBER 2017 TO SEPTEMBER, 2018 BY CP EDGAL O. IMOHIMI,
THE COMMISSIONER OF POLICE, LAGOS STATE POLICE COMMAND, IKEJA.**



INTRODUCTION

- I am indeed delighted to share the joy of today's occasion with you all as I deliver a report on the activities of Lagos State Police Command from November, 2017 to September, 2018. There is no gainsaying the fact that hitherto there existed huge security challenges in the Lagos socio-economic environment. It is however my pleasure to note that despair and apathy occasioned by the activities of criminal elements have gradually given way to a new dawn of peace and tranquility. This has been made possible by the sustained momentum and drive of the Lagos State Government, the Police and other stakeholders in their collective resolve to make insecurity a thing of the past in the state.
 - A lot has been said and written already about the unique position of Lagos State in Nigeria and the West African sub-region as the economic hub. Lagos State with a population of about twenty-four million is ranked as a mega-city. This new status has brought with it the strong need to make security and safety a number one priority.
 - Taking into consideration the various criminogenic factors that characterise mega cities, the following patterns of crime viz:- robbery, murder, fraud, car robbery, bank robbery, trans-border crimes are naturally expected to be on the increase. But it is heartwarming to note that in Lagos State, the reverse is now the case.
 - This did not come as a surprise. The novel approach of the Lagos State Government to set up a Security Trust Fund as a means of bolstering security in the state through capacity building has immensely impacted on security of lives and property in the state.
- This, coupled with my determination to tackle crime head-on, since my assumption of office as the Commissioner of Police, Lagos State Command, I leveraged on the robust goodwill existing between the Police and the State Government on one hand and members of the public on the other, to record some modest achievements, that have not only consolidated that of my predecessors, but has ensured that the Command keeps the flag flying.

FIND BELOW OTHER NOTABLE ACHIEVEMENTS RECORDED DURING THE PERIOD UNDER REVIEW

COMMUNITY POLICING AND COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP

- I hit the ground running by initiating and attending nineteen (19) Town Hall meetings where I introduced my policing plan to Lagosians. A plan powered by the philosophy of community policing and community safety partnership.
- I am happy to inform the house once again, that the strategy is *working and* there has been a drastic reduction in crimes generally in the state, especially car snatching, armed robbery, kidnapping, cultism et al. This is also attributable to the collaboration and contributions of Lagos State Government through the Lagos State Security Trust Fund (LSSTF) in the provision of logistics supports to the Command.
- **From November, 2017 to September, 2018;** a total of Two Hundred and Ninety (**290**) armed robbers were arrested while Nineteen (**19**) others died during encounters with the police. Thirty-Seven (**37**) vehicles were recovered during the period. Two Hundred and Thirty-Three (**233**) armed robbery attempts were foiled. A total of nine hundred and eleven (**911**) cultist renounced cultism, while Six Hundred and Sixty-Nine (**669**) suspected cultists were arrested. Regrettably, Two (**2**) Police Officers were shot dead in the line of duty.

ARREST OF SUSPECTED BADOO MURDERERS OF IKORODU PASTOR:-

On 25th of November, 2017, one Pastor Victor Kanayo of a Redeemed Christian Church of God Pastor in Ikorodu was murdered at about 0100hrs by four armed men who invaded his house and killed him in cold blood. They made away with the Pastor's phone after killing him. I promised Lagosians that I would apprehend those behind this reprehensible crime and thus I put my operatives to work. It is my pleasure to announce to you that two suspects have so far been arrested in connection with the crime. The phone and SIM card of the deceased pastor has been recovered from the two suspects by names Ibrahim Anifowose 'M' age 27 years and Uche Igwe 'M' age 22 years both of No. 50, Aremu Street Ojota and they are helping us in our investigation.

- **CASE OF CONSPIRACY, MURDER AND RITUAL KILLING**

On 30/12/2017, at about 0230 hours, at Alajo Close, Abule Osorun in Ibeshe, Ikorodu, a gang of three (3) killers addressed as Badoo by some sections of the press invaded Late Shakiru Yekini's compound, in the above mentioned location. The gang of three murderers/ritualists, comprising of one Chibuzor Igwe 'M', Samuel Akaeze 'M' a.k.a Samito, while the third person, one Obamoyegun Omotayo 'M' usually sprays a powdery substance into the victim's dwelling place that would make their targets to fall into deep sleep before they end their lives by smashing their skulls with a grinding stone. The said Obamoyegun Omotayo 'M' having been satisfied that the victims were dead; will use a white handkerchief to scrub their blood for ritual purposes. However, luck ran out on them when one of the victims raised alarm which attracted the local vigilante group. The vigilante group in turn alerted the Police in that area and the compound was cordoned off leading to the arrest of one Chibuzor Igwe 'M' at the scene.

The said Chibuzor Igwe who confessed to being a member of a killer gang a.k.a Badoo, made startling revelations to the Police that led to the arrest of Obamoyegun Omotayo 'M' and Samuel Ameze 'M' both of whom had earlier escaped from the scene. Please note that a grinding stone, smeared with blood and suspected to have been used in smashing the skulls of the victims at Alajo Close murder scene, at Ibeshe, Ipakodo, Ikorodu, have been recovered and taken to a top notch laboratory for forensic analysis and comparison with blood samples of the victims/suspects. Also arrested is one Gift Ameze 'F' wife of Samuel Ameze 'M' a.k.a Samito who acts as Pointer and provides information about where to strike to the group. The native doctor, one Adebayo Fatai a.k.a Adaripo was arrested at Imosan village Ijebu-Ode in an operation I personally led and the shrine destroyed. Also recovered at the shrine were some grinding stones believed to be part of the arsenal of this skull smashing gang.

- **RECOVERY OF ILLICIT DRUGS**

Recall that the President and Commander-In-Chief of the Armed Forces, President Muhammadu Buhari, GCFR, during his last visit to Kano State, gave a directive that security agencies should crackdown on illicit drug dealers.

In view of this directive, the Command mobilized its covert operatives to sniff out those who bring these illicit drugs into the country.

Our efforts paid off on the 8th day of December, 2017, based on credible intelligence which gathered that a 1 x 20 feet Container No. **28023414** on bill of Lading No. **S313831929** had some baggage of powdery substance suspected to be hard drugs. The suspected item was immediately recovered for further investigation.

On the 9th day of December 2017, a Letter No. **CR: 3000/LS/DFA/VOLT1** was sent to the forensic science laboratory center of the Force CIID, Alagbon requesting for a laboratory analysis of the substance suspected to be hard drug. However on the same date, the forensic report of the analysis carried out at the aforementioned laboratory came in a Letter No. CR: 300/X/FSL/41/2017. The HPLC analysis confirmed the substance to be Benzoylcegonine or cocaine with a street value of over Two Hundred Fifty Million Naira (₦250M).

The Lagos State Police Command would collaborate with the National Drug Law Enforcement Agency and other sister security companies to track those who bring these illicit drugs into the country.

On the 5th of January, 2018 the operatives of the Command arrested the members of a gang that attacked one AbubakarJibril 'M' of Erulan Street, Mile 12, Lagos State and dispossessed him of his Motorcycle at gunpoint. The gang of four(4) comprises of Prosper Olabode 'M'; Balogun Musiliu 'M'; Adepoju Jayeola 'M'; and Bolaji Lazeez 'M'. Meanwhile, one locally made pistol with four (4) live cartridges was recovered from them.

On the 7th of January, 2018 an armed robber terrorizing Idimu, Egbeda, Iyana-Ipaja and environs was arrested. The armed robber by name Opeisa Samson 'M' and members of his gang rode to Love Fast Food, Unity Estate, Idimu on two Honda Motorcycles. They robbed staff and customers of their phones, money and other valuables. However, luck ran out of the said Opeisa Samson as he was arrested with the following items: One (1) locally made Pistol cut to size; One (1) unexpended Cartridge.

- **CONSPIRACY AND STEALING OF NITEL CABLE**

On the 11th day of January, 2018 at about 0250 hours, the operatives of the Command intercepted five male suspects in possession of NITEL Cable at Fatai Atere Street Mushin, Lagos. Information about the criminal activities of the suspects namely: Mohammed Rabi - 41 years; Musiliu Iyande - 35 years; Musa Ibrahim - 32 years; Sheriff Usman - 22 years; and David Okpako - 28 years, got to the police and a team of crack detectives were dispatched to Fatai Atere Street, Mushin, Lagos where the aforesaid suspects were arrested at scene of crime.

The items recovered from them at the scene were: an unregistered Mack truck containing fifteen (15) pieces of cables; a Mercury Villager Space Wagon with registration number RSH-686-AJ containing two (2) heavy duty batteries and three (3) Jack chains.

During investigation, the suspects confessed that they were a syndicate which specialized in the vandalizing Nitel and Electricity Companies Cables (Defunct PHCN Cables) and that they have been in this cable stealing job for many years. Their operational areas include Lagos and Abeokuta in Ogun State.

- **ARREST OF SUSPECTED ARMED ROBBER WHO USUALLY DISGUISE AS A LUNATIC**

On the 15th day of January, 2018 at about 1500hrs, at Anifowose by Railway point 2018. The operative of the Command beat an armed robber who usually disguise as a Lunatic to his game. The robber, Identified as one Ogundemi Olayinka, 'M' of No. 12, Ayuba Adewale street, Ajao Estate could not miss the prying eyes of police operatives attached to Man-centre Division who had been keenly observing the behavior of the said Ogundami Olayinka and adjudged him a pretender. They stopped him and searched his person and the following items were recovered from him, viz ; A toy pistol POS Machine, 2 Tokems Bel Two I.D cards belonging to different people, A very big bunch of keys of different types, A live tortoise, A techno GSM cell phone, ladies bangles, different types of chains, laptop charger, a wrist watch.

• **CASE OF CONSPIRACY, MURDER AND RITUAL KILLING (possession of suspected human parts)**

On 17/01/2018, information received from a reliable source that an acclaimed Islamic cleric, Abdul-fatai Kayode was in possession of suspected human parts at Okedumola Street, Alakuko area of the state. I personally led policemen to the scene and the suspect was arrested. Female private parts, a kidney, intestines, a heart, lap, among other human parts, were allegedly found in his apartment.

The suspect said the parts were given to him by an herbalist identified simply as Sadiq for safekeeping. He said, "Sadiq a.k.a Ifa gave them to me. We intended to use them for money rituals for a client.

• **ARREST OF CYBERCRIMES SUSPECTS**

On the 7th February, 2018, at about 1800hrs, One Kemi Benson 'F' of Alhaji sunny compound Egbeda, Lagos reported to the police that on the 20/01/2018 at about 1700hrs, she held a birthday party for her son. When the party was in full swing, a phone belonging to her sister, Yinka was stolen. The victim in her own account stated that she went to the service provider for a SIM card replacement and that immediately she inserted the new card into her new phone, she started receiving transaction alerts.

A total of one million, one hundred and fifty three thousand naira (N1,153000.00) was withdrawn from her account in FCMB. There was also transfer of money from her account into three different accounts with the following details: FCMB Account No. 1888032010 belonging to Ikechukwu Anyaika; Diamond Bank Account No. 00706675464 belonging to Oyinuro Victor; UBA Account No. 2096578968 belonging to Joseph Blessing Benita.

Other withdrawals were equally made by VTU. Investigation by the undercover operatives of the Command revealed a syndicate of six young men divided into three groups.

The first group specialized in robbing Lagosians of their mobile phones and escaping by Okada. They thereafter hand over the SIM cards of the phones to the 2nd group. In this first Group are Nwanze Ifeanyi 'M' 27 years, Martin Achi 'M' 27 years and Solomon Dike 'M' 31 years.

The 2nd Group worked on the SIM cards using computer applications. They generate the names, the account number of the owner of the SIM including his BVN number. The recovered details are used to determine the account balance. Money in the account was transferred into different accounts. One Muritala Mohammed aka 'Swallow' is the specialist in this department.

The 3rd Group sourced for different accounts into which moneys are transferred. Their names are Ali Hassan 'M' 27 years and Shamson Mustapha 'M' 25 years.

All the six suspects have been arrested; two laptops and 10 SIM cards were recovered from them and they have confessed to the crime.

On the 18th day of February, 2018 at about 1240hrs, based on credible information available to the Command, that some cult members have converged at Idi-Oro area of Mushin planning to unleash terror on the law abiding members of the community. The Command immediately sent its operatives after them and three of them namely Deji Odeyemi 'M', Deji Amosun 'M' and Seriki Sodiq 'M' were

arrested.

A search warrant was executed on the shanty in where they stay to take hard drugs and which also serves as their drug haven. The following substances were recovered: 183 wraps of pawpaw shaped substances suspected to be cannabis marijuana aka Indian hemp; 129 Bible shaped substances believed to be cannabis marijuana and assorted types of hard drugs put inside bottles and sachets.

One of the associates of the suspects by name Choc who preserves these drugs is currently at large. Efforts to arrest him is on and very soon he will be caught.

Meanwhile the Command would obtain an order from the court to enable us destroy all the drugs in our custody with a street value of over Two Hundred Thousand Naira (₦200,000:00).

• **ARREST OF HARD DRUG PEDDLERS**

On 14th March, 2018, based on information received from Lagos State Ministry of Women Affairs, that pupils of some Primary/Secondary schools in Lagos were suspected to be indulging in hard drugs. Decoy operatives from RRS of the Lagos State Command in collaboration with the aforesaid Ministry located the schools (names withheld) and interviewed the pupils. This led to the arrest of one Franku Ibrahim 'M' 23 years and Ibrahim Sheu 'M' 40 years who have been selling TRAMADOL (highly addictive stimulant) to the underage pupils. I hereby advise parents to be extra vigilant and keep constant watch on their children and their friends. Parents should do a surprise check to their children often and look out for change in behaviour.

• **UNCOVERING OF AN ILLEGAL BREWERY**

On 11/04/2018, based on community policing and partnership, I mobilized policemen to discover that there was an illegal brewery producing fake malt drinks; stout and ethanol at Egbe-Afa, Igbobo area of Ikorodu in Lagos, which they pump into trucks to bottle at another location. This illegal brewery had more than 1,000 drums of brewed malt and up to 100 tanks where the drinks are pumped before supplying to tank drivers.

There is an illegal distillery where malt, stout and ethanol are being produced in an unhygienic environment thereby feeding poison to the people. You will recall that a fake wine factory was also uncovered at Mushin recently. Five suspects behind the factory were also arrested and prosecuted.

• **CASE OF UNLAWFUL SOCIETY/ARRESTS OF SUSPECTED CULTISTS**

On the 4th May, 2018 at about 1000hrs based on the information received of a dreaded cult group terrorizing the people of Ejirin-Iworo Area of Ikorodu, the O/C Anti-cultism SP Agbegbe Godwin and team swung into action and arrested four suspected cultists belonging to Eiye confraternity. They all confessed to belonging to Eiye confraternity. The suspects are as follows: Hassan Olaniyi 'M' 20 years old; Afolabi Muiz 'M' 18 years old; Wahab Moshood 'M' 26 years old; Ajenifuja Damola 'M' 23 years old. Meanwhile, Wahab Moshood is the leader and Kingpin of the cult group. Three cutlasses and two sharp knives were recovered from the suspects

- **CASE OF CONSPIRACY, STEALING AND OBTAINING MONEY BY FALSE PRETENCE**

On 28/06/2018, information was received from members of the public that there are some group of persons going round the metropolis, defrauding innocent citizens off their hard earned money, promising to double their money through magical means.

Based on the information, operatives from FSARS Ikeja and the Command operatives swung into action and arrested the following suspected fraudsters at Nglasia Hotel, Ilasa, Lagos, viz: George Osagie 'M' Age 51 years; and Makinde Kudus 'M' Age 28 years.

They were immediately searched and in the process, the following exhibits were recovered from them: Two (2) gallons of liquid labeled "Solen point"; a cash tank of US Dollars suspected to be fake; Platinum Brokers International Incorporation documents.

During interrogation, they confessed to have committed the crime and added that they are professional dupes. That once they are able to bring out the greed in any person, he becomes an easy prey. It was discovered that the suspects have so far defrauded one Victoria Awoniyi 'F' off the sum of Five Million, Seven Hundred Naira (₦5,700,000.00); Taiwo Kayode 'F' off the sum of Three Hundred Thousand Naira (₦300,000:00) and Adebisi Adebayo 'M' off the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Naira only (₦500,000:00).

- **ARREST OF SUSPECTED FAKE WINE PRODUCER/DISTRIBUTOR**

On 06/07/2018, at about 0900 hours, a Police Patrol team attached to Ikorodu Division while on Stop and Search duties intercepted a bus carrying 250 Cartons of Capic wine, suspected to be fake. The suspect/producer, one Ifeanyi Ude was immediately arrested and he made statement confessing to have committed the crime. This made it the fourth time in the year; the Command is arresting large scale producers/distributors of fake wine/alcoholic beverages.

- **CASE OF STEALING AND DIVERSION OF GOODS**

On the 25/07/2018, Our Intelligence Unit came up with information that an unspecified number of air-conditioners believed to be stolen from its owner, are being off loaded in to a warehouse at Iyana-Ira area of Lagos State. The Intelligence gathered was subsequently passed to FSARS Operatives for action. They went to Iyana-Ira, located the warehouse and arrested the following persons: Igwe Nchoeu 'M' 48 years, Moses Eghaghe 'M' 51 years, Suleman Aremu 'M' 65 years, Obinna Abiodun 'M' 40 years, Samuel Ogujiofor 'M' 34 years. The warehouse where the air-conditioners were kept was immediately searched and a total of two hundred and thirty eight (238) pieces of Royal Air-Conditioner products were recovered.

During interrogation, they confessed that they stole the goods and mentioned one Francis 'M' as their ring leader and the owner of the truck used in conveying the stolen items.

In the course of investigation, the operatives went to Sango Otta and recovered the said vehicle, a Mack truck, unregistered, where it was parked for sale. Investigation is

ongoing with a view to apprehending other suspects at large for prosecution. At this juncture, I wish to call on anybody or company with legitimate claim to the goods to come forward with proof of ownership.

- **CASE OF CONSPIRACY, BELONGING TO UNLAWFUL SOCIETY, MURDER AND RECOVERY OF ARMS AND AMMUNITION**

On 23/07/2018, the DPO Ilasamaja Police Station arrested one Maryam Abiola 'F' Age 20 years, a member of Eiye confraternity who is the arms keeper to her group members and confessed to have personally killed four (4) people. She further revealed that she is under oath administered to her by herbalist One Adio Ogunremi 'M'. They all work for the blood thirsty cultist, Sodiq Oyewunmi already in Police net. She also revealed that the box of arms was given to one Wasiu 'M', who is now on the run. The suspects arrested in connection with the case are: Sodiq Oyewunmi 'M' age 24years; Ihioma Emeka 'M' 25years; Adio Ogunremi 'M' 40 years; Abdulrasak Yusuf 'M' 32 years; Ironka Junior 'M' 22years; Segun Ademola 'M' 35 years; Anu Akinowo 'M' 21years; and Maryam Abiola 'F' Age 20 years. Exhibit recovered from suspects are; Two (2) live cartridges, Two locally made revolver pistol, nine pieces of 9mm live ammunition.

- **UNLAWFUL POSSESSION OF FIREARMS**

On 28/07/2018, the operatives of Lagos State Police Command arrested two officials of the Vigilante Group of Nigeria (VGN) for alleged unlawful possession of firearms, radio devices, and other prohibited accouterments. The suspects are Adekoya Adeniyi, 40yrs 'M' and Elliot Oluwaseyi, 44yrs 'M'. The command received complaints that Adeniyi obtained money under false pretenses. The detectives from the Human Right desk went to Adeniyi's house and during a search, three firearms were discovered, also radio devices, which the suspects were using to intercept police coded messages. During interrogation, the suspect confessed that the items recovered from his house were given to him by Elliot Oluwaseyi, 44, who was also arrested.

I am disappointed in them. How did they get the four radios and the police belt? Who programmed the radio for them? Where did they get the firearms with them? All vigilante groups and private individuals were directed by the Inspector-General of Police to return firearms in their possession. Why do they still have them? What were they doing with handcuffs? The suspects will definitely have their day in court.

- **CASE OF FAKE KIDNAP ORCHESTRATED BY ONE HADIJAT KABIR & HER GANG**

On the 2/8/2018, at about 1530hrs one Alhaji Kabir Muraino 'M' age 55years of Governor's Road, Ikotun reported at Ikotun Police Station that his wife named, Hadijat Kabir age 45years and his daughter Hamidat Kemi age 18years who is of unsound mind were kidnapped same date on their way to Psychiatric Hospital, Oshodi, Lagos.

That the kidnapers were demanding for the sum of N15m before the hostages would be released. Based on this, I directed the Anti-Kidnapping Squad to ensure speedy rescue of the hostages and arrest of the suspects.

Investigation revealed that the kidnappers were making their demands from a community in Ogun State, called Ado-Odo, Ado –Odo Ota LGA. The operatives of the squad were mobilized to the area and busted the camp of the kidnappers. The hostages were rescued and the following suspects were arrested. Ahmed Kudus 'M' 29years and Hadijat Rufai 'F' 39years all of Ado-Odo, Ogun State, while the rest fled the scene. When one of the hostages, Hadijat Kabir was being debriefed, she confessed that she planned her kidnap with the suspects arrested to defraud her husband. She named the following persons who are on the run to be part of the kidnap syndicate: Wasiu Rufai a.k.a Ojulyawodon (her native doctor), Luqmon Ahmed, Jossy (surname unknown)

• **ARREST OF SUSPECTED HOMOSEXUALS**

On 26/08/2018 at about 0030 hours, intelligence gathered revealed that some youths (males) will be initiated into a Gay/Homosexual Club between 0100 hours and 0200 hours, at Kelly Ann Hotel/ Event Centre, No. 3-7 Adenrele Street, Egbeda, an action contrary to section 1 (1) of Same Sex Marriage Act 2014. Consequent upon this, operatives led by DPO Shasha and DPO Idimu stormed the venue at 0200 hours. On arrival, young men numbering about eighty (80) were met in a hall taking different types of drinks including banned substance like Tramadol, Shisha laced with substances suspected to be Marijuana. As soon as they sighted the police, they ran into different directions. However, the team arrested fifty-seven (57) of them.

• **RENOUNCIATION OF CULTISTS**

- **120 Cult Members renounced in Badagry**
- **652 Cult Members renounced in Imota**
- **139 Cult Members renounced in Agbowa**

From January to August 2017, there was a 15% decline in crime rate, while the introduction of community policing/safety partnership and the increase in police visibility from **1st September, 2017 till date** has resulted in 65% decline in crime rate in Lagos State

• **COMMUNITY POLICING AND SAFETY PARTNERSHIP BUILT ON TRUST AND CONFIDENCE**

To win the trust and confidence of Lagosians, I set-up the **Citizens Complaint Hot Centre at the Police Intelligence Laboratory Alausa. Features of the centre include TEN (10) dedicated lines** where members of the public can call, text to report police misconduct and their matters can be urgently attended to. – **08067945296, 08063025274, 08063104759, 08113615350, 08113683077, 08096283148, 08096283173, 08089781657, 08126404930, 08081426895**

STRATEGIES EMPLACED TO FIGHT CRIME

- To ensure a low crime rate is sustained, increased police presence in all crime prone areas and other locations has been implemented. The Command is not only proactive in nature but intelligence-driven. Other strategies emplaced are:
- Re-invigoration of the intelligence gathering mechanism of the state and information sharing among security agencies;
- Purposeful and constant joint raids with personnel of the Lagos State Neighborhoods corps, Vigilante and DSS of identified criminal hideouts and black spots;

- Training and retraining of the officers on Human Rights, Election duty, Counter Terrorism, emergency response and combat operation readiness;
- Deployment of Counter Terrorism Unit and Bomb Squad personnel at key locations;
- Dissemination of the telephone numbers of the Area Commanders, Divisional Police Officers and other Principal Officers to the members of the public to enhance information flow to the police;
- Upon intelligence of an imminent breach of public peace, the Command constantly dialogues and encourages dialogue among warring groups;
- Prompt investigation and prosecution of all reported cases;
- Maintenance of robust working relationship with the Military and other security agencies;
- Aerial patrols by helicopters using the two multi-purpose helicopters acquired for the Command by the Lagos State Government;
- In conjunction with the State Government members of the NURTW and RTEAN have been made to understand that forceful taking over of motor parks will no longer be tolerated, except in line with the constitution of the unions. Where such occurs, the aggressors are promptly dislodged by the Command and advised to follow the due process;
- The government should on its part, sensitize the citizenry, that human life is sacrosanct.

CHALLENGES/CONSTRAINTS

- However, despite the massive contributions of the LSSTF to the Command, dearth of patrol vehicles remains a great challenge;
- Many vehicles attached to the divisions have become rickety and unserviceable due to old age and over usage;
- Another challenge is the frequent breakdown of the Command's communication system, thus, hindering operations and anti-crime activities. Currently, the Command has two repeaters bases situated at NITEL building Marina and Alausa.
- The one at Marina is too old, develops faults at random and makes radio communication extremely difficult;

NEEDS/WAY FORWARD

As a remedy, the following are the urgent logistics need of the Command:-

COMMUNICATION:

- Three (3) Motorola MTR2000 Repeaters, 100w heavy duty mood with cooling system;
- Three (3) 9DB gain heavy duty Omni-directional Antenna for MTR2000 repeater;
- Three (3) 100m Heliac low loss cable
- One (1) 3db gain Antenna for the existing base station in Maroko Police Station
- Four (4) 1.5 KVA Inverter (Maroko and Marina)
- Eight (8) 200mAH Heavy duty Lead Alkaline battery (Maroko, Marina and 2 other new repeaters)
- Three (3) 'U' Bracket for Antenna Installation
- Three (3) Installation (turning and Programming)
- Four Thousand (4,000) walkie-talkies;
- One hundred and fifty (150) Base Sets;

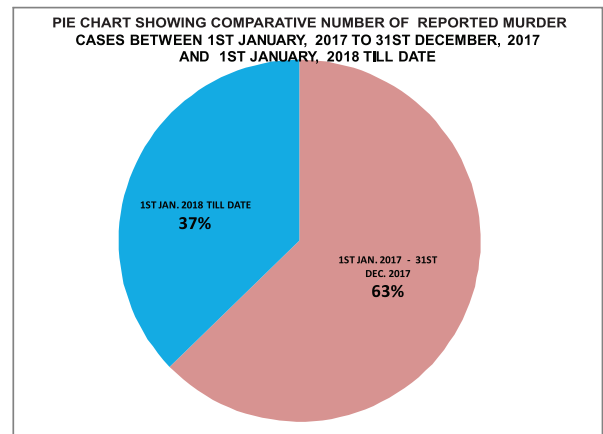
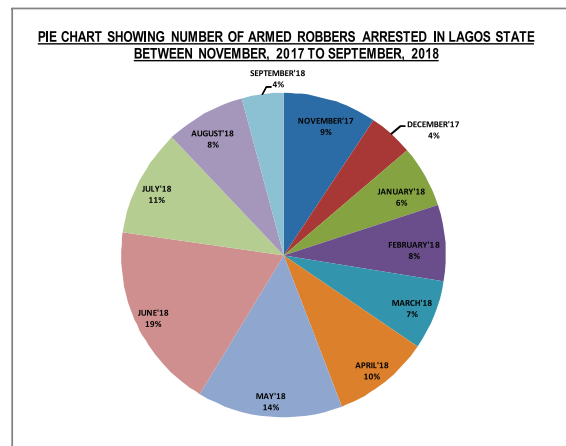
- Four (4) new repeaters, each with 60KVA generator and back-up batteries

PATROL VEHICLES/MOTORCYCLES:

- 200 patrol vehicles, equipped with communication gadgets;
- 5 lorries (troop carriers);
- 5 heavy duty towing vehicles.
- Other logistics requirements include arms and ammunition, riot gunners, smoke pistols, hand grenades, tear gas canister, thunder blasts, bullet proof vests, ballistic helmets, respirators, etc.

A brief on the activities of the Rapid Response Squad



Introduction

The “Operation Sweep” agency was a joint Army, Air Force cum Police crack team, established to combat the then growing rate of crime in the metropolis during the administration of Colonel Buba Marwa which had gone through various phases and now blossomed to the Rapid Response Squad, a unit of the Lagos State Police Command.

After re-structuring the outfit, it was repositioned and has allowed the Nigerian Police to assume total responsibility of the services of RRS in order to reflect the new democratic dispensation.

The rebranding and the injection of sophisticated operational capacities such as; fleet of patrol vehicles, Armoured Personnel Carriers, high powered motorbikes, patrol boats, choppers and police equipment by the Governor Mr. Akinwunmi Ambode led administration has tremendously helped complement policing and security in Lagos State.

One of the dominant achievements of Rapid Response Squad is speedy response to emergencies in any part of Lagos State. The outfit's swift response to emergencies has been a remarkable success in that men and materials get to crisis points before the nearest police posts or divisions.

Such interventions have assisted in curtailing crimes and arresting suspects, maintenance of orderliness, saving lives and property as well as creating conducive environment for economic activities. This is achieved with the daily strategic positioning of RRS patrol vehicles and Armoured Personnel Carriers (APCs) in various parts of the state as well as 24-hour waterways and air patrol of Lagos.

Such areas of interventions include: Otedola Bridge Tanker fire, Akala/Mushin Police – Drug barons clash, Ajegunle Cult Clash, Agboyi – Ketu Okada riders and

community clash, Ibaso – Ibeshe Community Clash, Oshodi Gang war e.tc

Between November 2017 and October 2018, the RRS has been able to foil some of the following criminal activities;

➤ Arrested numerous suspected criminals in action in various parts of the metropolis:

- 6 suspected trans – border criminals who stole 13 pieces of truck tyres, 26 gallons of 4 litres of engine oil, 24 gallons of 25 litres of engine oil and two truck batteries. (October 2018)
- 2 suspected Armed Robbers and recovery of locally made short gun, four Ford Explorer alloy Reams and two tyres in Fashola Estate, Ajah.
- 3 notorious one chance robbers on the Third Mainland Bridge and arrest of two fake soldiers involved in truck filled consignment in Lagos – Epe Expressway, Ajah (September 2018).
- Suspects involved in illegal disclosure of WAEC Examination question papers in Edo, Osun and Ondo State (April 2018)
- Suspects of UBER and Taxify car snatching robbers, and the recovery of two Toyota Corolla cars meant for UBER and Taxify. The investigations led to arrest of the killers of an UBER driver in Ajah. (March 2018)
- Suspected phone thieves and SIM cards hacking gang. The six man suspects used stolen phones and SIMS to hack into people's bank accounts and electronically transfer funds into series of other accounts.
- 4 Okada robbers/cultists and the recovery of a locally made pistol with 2 live cartridges. (January 2018)
- Recovered 2 (two) locally made pistols, 1 (one) beretta pistol and 1 (one) AK–47 rifle.
- Recovered the following vehicles: 2 Toyota Corolla, 1 Mitsubishi car, 2 trucks, 2 tankers, 2 CRV 4WD, 1 (one) Honda CRV, a Mitsubishi car filled with stolen beauty products and 2 Commercial buses.
- **Supportive Services and Assistance to Lagosians.** Activities under this heading include administering First Aid to accident victims such as stopping bleeding, putting victims in recovery positions and cardio – pulmonary respiration (CPR), assisting road users with faulty cars, amongst others.

In a not too distance future, we expect an RRS to gets to scenes of emergencies and crisis almost instantly. Our future is that of a much more secure Mega City with reduced crime rates.

A BRIEF ON THE ACTIVITIES OF THE MARINE POLICE



Introduction

As you are aware, the Marine Police was established in the year 1891 in Lagos, Nigeria and was then called “Night Water Patrol”. Though, there are certain peculiarities of the Marine Section, it is regarded as part of regular Police division and they are saddled with basic operational duties such as anti-smuggling patrol, anti-vandal, anti-piracy, anti-militancy/kidnapping operations, enforcement of ports, harbor and shipping acts, surveillance, general anti-crime duties and others.

The Marine unit conducts its operations in territorial inland waters (measuring from the inward limit of the coastal waterways of the fairway buoy), Ports and Harbors. Their powers and authority are drawn from the constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, Police Act and various other Acts and legislation.

The Department's Activities

In recent times the unit has adopted strategies such as intensive waterways Patrol, quick response to distress calls, visibility of Police boats in vulnerable areas, surveillance and monitoring of all activities within the waterways to ensure the safety and security of lives and property in their area of jurisdiction.

A couple of months ago, Ise and Epe environs have witnessed some security threat from Militants, kidnappers and sea pirates from neighboring States who attempted to gain access through creeks to commit crime in Lagos State. The Department with support from AIG Zone 2, the State Government and the Lagos State Security Trust Fund was able to repel these criminals in line with the State's goal of making Lagos Waterways safe.

Two examples of the accomplishments of the unit are:

- The restoration of law and order to Itua-Agan and Tamoro Communities after a kingship dispute on 7th of August, 2018 resulted in wanton destruction of valuable property and left many people with serious injuries.
- The timely intervention of the Marine Police led to the successful rescue of 20 passengers on a passenger boat with the inscription “BLUE BOAT MARINE” which ran over a submerged object and capsized around Oworoshoki waterfront enroute to Ikorodu on the 26th of July, 2018.

The Marine Police Unit also engages in enlightenment/awareness campaigns on safety to encourage community participation in Policing the settlements around the waterways. The department's patrolling strategy and the 24 hours presence of gunboats stationed at entry points of Lagos as listed: Two (2) points at Ise, Three (3) at Epe, Two (2) at Lagos Break Water, One (1) at Owode-Onirin, Two (2) at Marina Police Base, One (1) at Festac and One (1) in Badagry.

Roles of the Lagos State Security Trust Fund and the Lagos State Government

The improvement in the operations of the Marine Police, Lagos State Command in combating criminal activities along the Lagos waterways, can be attributed to the support of the Lagos State Security Trust Fund and the State Government. The support includes the constant provision of lubricants, regular servicing of the boats, provision of life jackets, life buoys, fire extinguishers and most importantly AGO (diesel) for the running of the Armoured Combat Patrol Gunboats, and PMS (petrol) for the Fibre Gunboats and other back up boats.

The Department sincerely appreciates the effort of the Governor of Lagos State and the Lagos State Security Trust Fund for their immense assistance and urges private organizations and individuals to make contributions to the Fund in order to ensure the continued operation of the Marine Police Unit.

Challenges experienced by the Marine Police in the provision of Security in Lagos State

Though the Marine Police department has been making great strides in securing the waterways, its operation will greatly improve with the provision of:

Dockyard and Slipway: Boats maintenance inevitably requires the availability of docking facilities for regular dry-docking and maintenance. Slipway cradle is needed for lifting up the boats out of water.

Additional Fibre Gunboats: The deployment of appropriate patrol fast moving locally made Fibre Gunboat fitted with double 200HP outboard Yamaha Engines will enhance patrols on waterways.

Back-up boats: The deployment of appropriate patrol back-up boats fitted with 75HP outboard Yamaha Engines to patrol the shallow creeks, where the gunboats might not be able to reach.

Station and Observation Posts for Marine Police at Ise, Festac, Ojo, Owode-Onirin, Ikorodu and Badore: These are major flash points on Lagos state waterways. To this end it is paramount that Marine Police establishes out Stations in these aforementioned places. This further defers militants' kidnappers, pirates and other criminals in the area so that commercial activities can continue to go on smoothly.

Improved welfare package for officers and men: It is pertinent to also mention that welfare package be given to officers and men of the Marine Police in Lagos State Police Command, to boost the morale of the men.

In conclusion, the Marine Police pledges to continue to carry out their duties to the best of their ability.

A BRIEF ON THE ACTIVITIES OF THE LAGOS NEIGHBOURHOOD SAFETY AGENCY (LNSA)



The Lagos Neighbourhood Safety Agency was inaugurated by His Excellency, Governor Akinwunmi Ambode on the 23rd day of November, 2016 in pursuant of the Lagos State Neighbourhood Safety Agency Law No. 8 which came into effect on 15th day of August, 2016. The Agency has a 12 man Board led by the Chairman, DIG Israel O. Ajao, (RTD), OON, NPM, mni,.

The Agency has established the Neighbourhood Safety Corps with a strength of 5,700 Corps Officers spread across the 57 Local Government and Local Council Development Areas of the State. The Agency has appointed men and women in line with the eligibility criteria provided by Section 15 of the LNSA law.

The objective of the Agency is to assist and complement the efforts of security and safety agencies in the state to enforce laws and ensure protection of lives and property by gathering credible intelligence.

An effective roadmap for security in Lagos State over the next decade requires concerted efforts in confidence building and advocacy by the LNSA to ensure that community and grassroots law enforcement takes its prime of place in the State.

Achievement

The Lagos State Neighbourhood safety Agency has synergized with the Nigeria Police Force by engaging in joint patrols, night and day, engaged in show of force with other Security Agencies in the State. This assisted tremendously in crime reduction and restoring citizens' confidence in the State security structure.

A few other achievements of the LNSC include the following:

On December 30th, 2017, the LNSC received information about the operation of notorious cult gang "Badoo" at Ajao Close, Ibeshe in Igbogbo – Baiyeku LCDA. The timely intervention of the Corps led to the arrest of one Chibuzor Igwe, an active member of the gang who

revealed the gang's sponsors. The suspect was handed over to the Commissioner of Police, Lagos for investigation.

On January 1st, 2018, two suspected fraudsters, Bassey Ekong and Babatunde Adeyemi were arrested through information received by the LNSC as they attempted to defraud one Miss Rita Uzugaa by pretending to "double money" for her. The suspects were transferred to SCIID Pantl for investigation.

On January 19th, 2018, between 0000hrs and 0200hrs, the LNSC provided credible intelligence which led to the arrest of 19 secret cultists at various locations at Shapati Town, Ibeju Lekki. They belong to the "Eiye" and "Omije" cult groups. They were handed over to the SCIID Pantl for investigation.

Similarly, on January 31st, 2018, a serial burglar, one Kunle Ogunsanya was arrested at Igbodo area of Ijede LCDA for burglary and stealing. In the course of preliminary investigation, he confessed to being involved in other robberies along Agbowo – Itokin Road, Lagos between 2015 and 2016 respectively. He was handed over to the State CIID, Pantl for investigation.

On February 20th, 2018, six members of the "Eiye" secret cult who specialize in abducting and raping innocent teenage Secondary School girls as means of initiation were arrested at Lagos Island East LCDA. Preliminary investigation revealed that one of them, Kayode Damilare is the custodian of arms for the gang. Consequently, they were handed over to the Police.

On February 22nd, 2018, four suspected fraudsters: Johnson Friday, Ikechukwu Anjore, Ugochukwu Eze and Chinanu Abengue who defrauded two victims of ₦150,000 and ₦242,000 respectively were arrested at Okokomaiko through information gathered by the LNSC. They were handed over to the Area Commander, Festac, who arraigned them in Court.

On March 12th, 2018, 12 suspected cultists and gang members were arrested at Megida Area of Ipaja – Ayobo LCDA by the LNSC Patrol Team. They belong to the "shadow" boys and "Gbadu – Gbadu" squad that terrorize innocent citizens within and around Ayobo environs including motor parks. They were transferred to the Anti – Cult Unit of Lagos State Police Command.

In conclusion, the officers are most grateful to His Excellency the Governor and the Lagos State Security Trust Fund for providing equipment and logistics for the agency to effectively carry out its responsibilities.

A BRIEF REPORT ON THE ACTIVITIES OF OPERATION MESA (OP MESA)



Introduction

The OP MESA is an initiative of the Lagos State Government comprising of Military security formations which conduct support activities to aid the civil security agencies in the discharge of their statutory responsibilities. The OP MESA outfit consists of men from the Army, the Navy and the Air Force under the command of **Brigadier General A.E. Attu, Commander 9 Beecroft, Navy Commodore O. E. Eyo, Commander NNS Commander 651 Base Services Group Nigerian Air Force** respectively. The military are currently involved in internal security operations aimed at maintaining law and order in 27 States of the Federation in line with the provisions of Section 217 of the Constitution of the Federal republic of Nigeria 1999. OP MESA's primary responsibility is anti-crime patrol although they participate in joint raids of identified Black Spots with other agencies such as the Police and SSS and in responding to distress calls.

Area of Responsibility

- Army** – The 10 units of the Nigerian Army are participants of the troops involved in the operation of the OP MESA which focuses on areas in Victoria Island, Apapa, Ikorodu, Ikeja, Badagry, Ojo, Seme Border, Mushin, Mile 2, and Epe. (Ikoyi Mile 2, Badagry, Ikeja, Ogba, Ojo, Ikorodu, Mile 12, Ajah, Lagos Island, Idi-Araba, Agbara and oil pipelines in the State).
- Navy** – This arm of the OP MESA outfit is in charge of areas covering; Agege, Apapa, Ijora, Ajegunle, and some parts of Mile 2 and oil pipelines and tank farms in Lagos State.

- Air Force** – The Air force arm is in charge of; Ikeja, Mushin, Isolo, Apapa, Ijaye, Oshodi, and Alimosho including Ikotun, Egbeda, Shasha, and its environment.

Mode of Operations of the OP MESA

The outfit performs series of mobile and static surveillance patrol to their Areas of Responsibility (AOR), likely black spots as a form of show of Force to deter would be criminals and maintains a reserve to facilitate quick reinforcement or support to any mobile group when necessary.

The activities of the OP MESA are coordinated by the State Security Council chaired by His Excellency the Governor to ensure that the three (3) arms work together as an effective unit while the required operational requirements are provided by the State Government and the Lagos State Security Trust Fund. The OP MESA has continued to partner with other security agencies to ensure peace and order in the State by assisting in the arrest of imposters, kidnappers and human traffickers, restraining smuggling activities and providing security in critical areas in the State.

Challenges

In spite of the achievements the OP MESA the unit requires more logistic/support such as: Patrol vehicles, equipment, protective gears (fragmented jackets and helmets) to boost its operational capacity, and confidence in the men.

Conclusion

The Commanding Officers of the OP MESA once again seize this opportunity to express their appreciation to His Excellency Governor Akinwunmi Ambode and the Lagos State Security Trust Fund for their support to the unit and promises to perform their duties to the best of their ability towards a crime free Lagos.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the IESBA Code, and in accordance with other ethical requirements applicable to performing the audit of Lagos State Security Trust Fund.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other Information

The Trustees are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the Report of the Trustees, the Statement of Value Added and the Five-Year Financial Summary as required by the Financial Reporting Council of Nigeria which we obtained prior to the date of this report. Other information does not include the financial statements and our Auditors' report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express an audit opinion or any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed on the other information obtained prior to the date of this auditors' report, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of the Trustees for the Financial Statements

The Trustees are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards and the requirements of the Lagos State Security Trust Fund Law and the Financial Reporting Council Act No. 6, 2011, and for such internal control as the Trustees determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are responsible for assessing the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Trustees either intend to liquidate the Fund or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditors' report. However, future events or conditions may cause The Fund to cease to continue as a going concern.
- ▶ evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY OF THE REPORT ON THE LAGOS STATE SECURITY SUMMIT 2018



BACKGROUND

On December 13, 2017 at the Lagos State Security Trust Fund Annual Town Hall Meeting on security, the Lagos State Governor, HE Mr. Akinwunmi Ambode announced that a security summit will be convened in the first quarter of 2018 to address the security challenges in the state and develop a sustainable framework for the future. The summit was duly held on April 9, 2018. The organizing committee of the summit was chaired by Mr. Opeyemi Agbaje, a member of LSSTF Board and included eminent citizens, with the ES/CEO of LSSTF, Dr. Abdurrazaq Balogun as secretary.

Lagos State is one of the smallest states in Nigeria in terms of landmass, but has the largest population and growth rate, estimated at 10 times faster than New York and Los Angeles and more than the population of 32 African nations combined. The population of Lagos State is expected to reach 35million people by 2020. Population growth and economic vitality come with inherent security challenges.

The administration of HE Governor Akinwunmi Ambode convened the Lagos State Security Summit 2018:-

- To develop and agree an overall security strategy and system in Lagos State
- Engage and secure input and buy-in of all critical stakeholders to the said security strategy and

system.

- To seek home grown solutions that can be implemented by the Lagos State Government
- To design a sustainable security framework for a modern megacity.

The theme of the summit was, **“Securing Lagos State: Towards a Sustainable Framework for a Modern Megacity”**.

PRINCIPLES UNDERPINNING THE SECURITY STRATEGY

- Lagos State security architecture must involve “thinking from the future”.
- Lagos State must embrace people-centred methods and means.
- Community-driven policing backed by technology is the way forward.
- Not much is known about the “policing of technology”- we must bear in mind the threats that might come from technology!
- Institutional backup will be required.
- Lagos State government must not only be passionate about the development of the state but also the security of the people.
- The approach of this strategy must be more about prevention than countering violence and terror.
- The state needs to be conscious of the “politics of security” in a nation-state.
- Lagos is located in the country of a regional hegemon-the state's security architecture must be sub-regional in nature (ECOWAS) as many of the state's security challenges are resultant from local and international boundaries.
- The geographical configuration of Lagos State requires that its security framework take into consideration its aquatic environment. The state needs to secure or eliminate ungoverned spaces.

THE STRATEGIC IMPLEMENTATION PLAN FOR SECURITY IN LAGOS STATE

The strategic implementation plan covers initiatives categorised under fourteen (14) sub-headings- education, data gathering and intelligence analysis, technology, institution-building, maritime, social, media, legal, environment, training, finance, international and border states, transportation and formal/informal security operators.

EDUCATION: Recommendations include making security awareness compulsory in the curriculum of primary and secondary schools with development of associated technology and applications; and developing standards and guidelines for security and safety in schools including security training for school heads. Security education should cover town unions, cooperatives, markets and artisan groups.

DATA GATHERING AND INTELLIGENCE ANALYSIS: Widespread CCTV installations with standards supported by a legislative framework and feeding security agencies with mandatory installations in public spaces. Other measures including smart phone apps to aid citizen reporting; biometrical registration of residents under the Lagos State Residents Registration Agency (LASRRA) with special attention on “okada” and tricycle riders, commercial bus drivers, domestic staff and local security guards. The state should aim for 100% residents' coverage and leverage other database such as BVN, NIMC etc.; invest in robotics and drones for patrol and surveillance plus 24/7 mobile patrol service; and mandatory installation of CCTV in all new public buildings before building approval. Additional initiatives are included in the detailed strategic implementation plan.

INSTITUTION BUILDING: Take specified actions to strengthen various relevant institutions – Lagos Neighbourhood Safety Agency (LNSA), LGAs/LCDAs. LGAs/LCDAs Peace and Security Committees, Lagos State Security Council, Lagos State Council of Nigerian Inter-Religious Council (NIREC), Lagos State Council of Obas, Local Emergency Operating Committees, LASEMA Response Units, RRS, etc. and strengthen collaboration with immigration, DSS, military, private sectors and other agencies and bodies to strengthen security capacity in the state.

MARITIME: Recruitment of locals as “marine marshals” and strict regulation of boats, jetties and other maritime operations. Invest in maritime domain awareness; strengthen maritime patrols with the objective of addressing identified threats including piracy, armed robbery, terrorism, arms, weapons and human trafficking, illegal/unregulated fishing, and damage to maritime environment.

SOCIAL: Various recommended measures to assist in employment, jobs/skills development, youth engagement, law and order, regulation of alcoholic beverages and other injurious substances, street

lighting, regulation or prohibition of street trading and turning beggars and destitute into productive citizens, as contained in the detailed strategic implementation plan.

MEDIA: Leveraging social media to monitor security related news and disseminate security information; partnering with Lagos State Signage and Advertisement Agency (LASAA) and private outdoor media agencies to increase security awareness; ensuring LGAs/LCDAs engage in periodic security enlightenment; and increasing synergy between media and security agencies, encouraging investigative journalism as a crime resolution tool.

LEGAL: Develop laws, guidelines, protocols and regulations for:-

- Security of public places e.g. parks, hotel, clubs, bars, markets, shopping malls, restaurants etc.
- Security practices in Lagos State including private guards, bouncers, close protection officers, bodyguards, escorts etc.
- A system to register all cases settled at police stations.
- Review of crime reports of all police stations
- Registration of convicted persons
- Residents registration and relocation notice
- Special court for cybercrimes and enlightenment.
- Enforcement of all laws and training of law enforcement agents
- Security infrastructure including CCTV, screening devices, alarm systems etc. in public buildings.
- Regulation of empty parcels of land/signage on commercial/business properties.
- Transparency regarding transfer of small arms
- Review of magistrate courts.

ENVIRONMENT: Appropriate health, safety and security regulations in abattoirs, markets and public spaces; investing in bio-security; and mandatory environmental protection by organisations in Oil and Gas Free Trade Zones (OGFTZs) and Free Trade Zones (FTZs) as Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR).

TRAINING: Develop curriculum, competences and training in cyber security, intelligence gathering and community policing, water/aquatic search and rescue, management of major incidents e.g. terrorism, air disasters, certified and accredited training programs in IT operations, emotional

intelligence, communication skills, conflict management and other related soft/people skills, modern enforcement of security agencies in the State.

FINANCE: Implement a range of measures specified in the Strategic Implementation Plan to ensure sustainable funding of security including security levies on corporates/businesses, social events and revenue generating associations (market, trade, transport associations etc.); crowd-funding; grants and donations; income from registration of private guards and formal and informal security operatives and from Lagos State Security Impact Assessment Framework; various taxes and charges; and public-private partnerships.

INTERNATIONAL AND BORDER STATES: Understand dimensions and impact of conflicts in neighbouring countries; increase security collaboration with border states in conjunction with Federal Ministry of Foreign affairs, Immigration, police, customs and DSS; initiate collaboration, data sharing and joint police patrol with neighbouring states; and increase synergy with border security agencies.

TRANSPORTATION: Recommendations include registration and biometric capture of all public and private commercial transport operations; implementation of designated commercial vehicle number plates; colour coding of commercial vehicles based on LGAs/LCDAs; mandatory police posts in motor/bus parks etc.

FORMAL/INFORMAL SECURITY OPERATORS:

Development of a system for registration, identification and licensing of all private guards and private security operatives and vigilantes; and development of a competency framework for specialities in security management for hotels, clubs, bars, markets, shopping malls, and specialized practices e.g. bouncers, bodyguards.

CONCLUSION

The strategic implementation plan comprises of a detailed implementation framework including identification of all implementation partners and priority/timing rating in terms of short, medium or long term activities. The Strategic Implementation Plan arising from the Lagos State Security Summit 2018 provides a robust and viable pathway to a sustainable security framework for Lagos State and its effective implementation should lead to Lagos being a safer, more secure modern megacity.

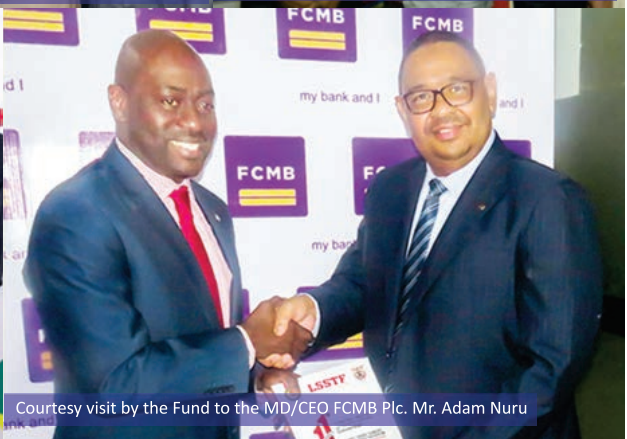
