

#### CHAIRMAN'S SPEECH



CHAIRMAN'S WELCOME ADDRESS AT THE 8TH TOWN HALL MEETING ON SECURITY WITH THE GOVERNOR

our Excellency, Distinguished Ladies and Gentlemen, I have the pleasure yet again to welcome you all to the 8th Town Hall Meeting on Security with the Governor, His Excellency Babatunde Raji Fashola, SAN.

It has been almost 8 years now and our Trust Fund is still very relevant in providing support for the police and other security agencies, primarily because our esteemed donors have continued to contribute to ensure that our collective resolve to continue the fight against crime is kept alive. It is my belief that this continuous support is an acknowledgement of the fact that there is no alternative to our relatively successful security funding

model, and on behalf of the Lagos State Government, the Board of the Fund and indeed the good people of Lagos, I say thank you so very much.

The past year had been very challenging especially with the difficult business climate, but we were still able to provide more support to security agencies, the details of which will be provided by the Executive Secretary. I should point out here that in spite of our intervention, the security agencies are still under resourced due to years of neglect by the federal government so you can only imagine how terrible the security situation would have been without the efforts of the Fund and the state government.

The Board of Trustees of the Fund, which I have had the privilege to chair since inception, has in the last seven plus years focused on the careful and targeted management of the Funds resources. Our focus has been on the various categories of violent crime and more recently the threat of terrorism. To effectively deal with these issues we must continue to consistently provide tools for the various departments saddled with the responsibility of dealing with them—the police divisions, the intelligence service and the various military formations.

No security agency can function without vehicles, fueling, maintenance, bulletproof vests and helmets, uniforms, handcuffs, all weather gear, communication assets, and etc in order to effectively perform their duties. Other issues include upgrading of police stations, offices and bases. A visit to any police station will reveal the less than ideal working condition of the men who put themselves in harm's way for our sake.

Though it is the constitutional responsibility of the federal government to provide the required security infrastructure, when and how this responsibility would be fulfilled is not known as the federal government, despite all its claimed reform in the security sector, has

no clear plan for resourcing security agencies. The facts are there for all to see.

The problem is further compounded by the war against insurgency and the recent continuous fall in global oil prices. Barely two weeks ago, in response to the continuous reduction in oil prices, the Finance Minister indicated that a reduction in public expenditure will be one of the measures to be adopted by the federal government, and this will clearly have an impact on their current anemic funding. However, despite the reduction in federal allocations to states over the past year, the Lagos state government has continued to subsidise federal support to security agencies where it exists, in their determination to provide safety for its citizens.

There is no doubt that as a nation, we are facing the most challenging security threat since the civil war, and we cannot wish away the realities in our country. We must therefore continue to support the security agents operating in our state to deter, track down, confront, arrest, and prosecute criminals, so that our social and business lives can prosper and our children can be safe.

Ladies and gentlemen, while the Fund continues to operate according to the principle of judicious use of resources and proper accountability, it is paramount that we maintain our very strong sense of public and community spirit by doing all we can as individuals, private organizations and government to enable us move closer to our desired outcomes.

Let me conclude by welcoming you once again, and urging you to listen carefully to the reports by the Executive Secretary, the Commissioner of Police, and His Excellency the Governor's vision for security in Lagos State while you decide on how much you intend to contribute to our collective endeavour for a safer Lagos.

Thank you once again for your attendance and in anticipation of your future contributions.

#### GOVERNOR'S SPEECH



bid you a very warm welcome to the 8th Town Hall Meeting on Security, and, significantly, my final attendance at this landmark event as the Governor of Lagos State.

Because of this unique circumstance, my role today is to thank you for your unprecedented support and to appeal that, even after I have left office, it is imperative that you continue to support the process.

Ladies and Gentlemen, it has indeed been a fulfilling continuous engagement, illustrating the power of collective endeavour. Indeed, in this most testing period in Nigeria's often troubled history, it has been this collective endeavour that has kept us, here in Lagos, relatively safe, and I commend us all for what we have been able to achieve.

If there was any measure by which our Government was to be assessed, I think our dogged and unflinching commitment to protection of life and property would stand out as one of our shining beacons of progress.

It is this commitment that has helped in no small measure to keep law and order, from which other developmental initiatives have sprung forth.

When I first took on the mantle of leadership of the state in 2007, things were quite difficult to put it mildly.

Violent crime, with limited police response, was a daily reality and there did not seem to be any clear pathway to address the problem.

At the end of my first day at work on May 30, 2007, when I was looking forward to sharing my first day's experience with my family, it was not to be.

Somebody had been robbed and murdered in traffic. On the next day it was an elder citizen who was robbed in his home. On the third day, a woman was shot with a baby on her back.

When I asked the Commander of the Rapid Response Squad responsible for violent crimes why they were not responding, the revelation was shocking.

They had few, if any, patrol vehicles, there was no fuel, they bought uniforms, they had no bullet proof vests, and worse still,

they had only 37 (Thirty Seven) rifles for the whole state, exclusive of what was in the various Divisional Police Offices.

This is where we came from to where we are, with your support.

Indeed, the major conversation at social events was about who had been the latest victim of a robbery, where it had taken place, whether on the road or at a home, and what had been the cost in lives and property.

Few, if any, shops, pharmacyor petrol stations opened after 7pm. The night economy was simply in need of a stimulus to get it back up.

The quality of life was profoundly affected by an atmosphere of fear and anxiety. That was the daily reality in 2007 and it troubled me deeply.

Now, if I had adopted the purist approach, I would have been entitled to say, as many governors around the country legitimately claimed, that addressing the crime situation did not fall under my constitutional remit.

After all, although conventional wisdom holds that I am the "Chief Security Officer" of my state, that title is, as has been expressed ad nauseum, merely a nominal one.

I have no control over the police, the armed forces or the intelligence services, nor am I able, directly, to discipline or redeploy even a DPO for not living up to his responsibilities, and therefore I cannot be held accountable for the crime situation in my state.

After all, they say we are "not ripe" for state police.

Ladies and Gentlemen, taking this argument further, it must be acknowledged that our unique constitutional structure places all control and operational command of the police, the army and the intelligence services under the exclusive control of the President, and budgetary responsibility is limited to the National Assembly.

So strictly speaking, I am not obliged to do anything with regard to security. That is the under-pinning philosophy of constitutional democracy, clarity of mandate.

But what happens if the level of government charged with the mandate for security consistently fails in carrying out that mandate? Do we sit down, twiddling our thumbs, and do nothing about it?

My answer to that was "No"! The citizens of Lagos elected me to address their problems, and I determined that irrespective of what Abuja did, I would be awake, and working with the relevant agencies and the good citizens of the state I would endeavour to achieve a sufficient level of security to enable people go about their legitimate business, a state of affairs that law enforcement experts refer to as "the relative absence of fear."

Today many streets are lit up at night, the shops and fuel stations run till and beyond midnight, some do so for 24 hours, the night economy is up and running, supported by patrol vehicles and our security men.

A state police is a necessity dictated by commonsense.

As we prepare for the 2015 election, this would seem to me to be a strong campaign platform for any person seeking to hold legislative office at state and national level, given our current security challenges and realities.

How did we climb out of a situation of daily bank robberies to which the Police could not respond to a situation where there were no bank robberies for over 4 (four) years, and the attempts that followed have ensured that there has been no successful armed invasion of a bank in Lagos since 2008.

The answer is simple.

We used our most important resource. Our people. Many of them too numerous to mention.

From Alhaji Musiliu Smith, former Inspector General of Police, who chaired the Committee I set up to DIG

Kazeem, whose report our 40 (Forty) Legislators adopted into the State Security Trust Fund Law, to Mr. Remi Makanjuola, Fola Arthur-Worrey and others who have served as our Trustees, my gratitude to you all is deep and profound.

Bankers like Jim Ovia, Kehinde Durosinmi-Etti, Mrs Cecilia Ibru, Jacob Ajekigbe and others who made the first donations, to Commissioners of Police like MD Abubakar, Marvel Akpoyibo through to our current Commissioner of Police who have put the resources to great use.

From only 37 (Thirty Seven) rifles, available to the Rapid Response Squad, with your support and that of our Local Governments, we now have thousands of guns, millions of rounds of bullets, bullet proof vests, helmets, uniforms, hundreds of patrol vehicles, patrol boats, armoured personnel carriers and supply of fuel.

It has been a long and exciting undertaking with members of the Security Council, we have worked hard, built a toll free emergency number, a command and control centre, installed cameras, established a crime data register that now has records of who have passed through our criminal justice system.

With these, we have developed a reputation as a State that does not forget a crime committed on its soil or against her people.

This was the verdict of one criminal who was wanted for 14 years until we got him finally.

One after the other, we solved crimes, apprehended criminals, took them off our streets and put them where they could not harm you or your children.

The logic behind the fund was to use our resources to protect ourselves and others, instead of using it to protect ourselves alone.

And that is where the real battle against crime begins, at the organic cutting edges of the agencies, in the divisions and area commands within the States, with effective visible patrol presence, and early intervention on a daily basis.

This is the reason why I find it worrisome that the Presidency can remain unconcerned, about reports that some young men and women in black uniforms are being gathered daily at the toll gate end of Lagos, it's commercial capital, under the guise of SURE P/FERMA Federal Task Force, without any legal basis and without the knowledge of the Police or any constitutionally established agency.

What law enforcement responsibility are these people entrusted with?

To which constitutional agency do they report? What happened to the Police, Armed Forces, Civil Defence and other lawfully established agencies?

Is it a good counter-insurgency strategy to turn a blind eye to a gathering of hundreds of young men and women who have no known supervision to whom they account?

Are they the Special Squad we have read about in the recent past?

I think it is important to remind the Federal Government, especially the Presidency of the history behind the management of the group that now champion the insurgency that we are now dealing with today.

It is obvious that little regard is paid at the center to the "broken window" theory, a theory that propounds that small acts of disrespect for the law, unaddressed over a long period will ultimately snowball and lead to a break-down of law and order generally.

It seems to me that this is the most auspicious time to depart from the old thinking and practice that attaching several hundreds or thousandsof armed policemen as so-called VIP guards to those considered important will solve the problem.

That method has never worked. It will not work. We must police our entire society and not just our VIPs.

We understand the main problems, and have consistently confronted them - public order, armed

robbery, kidnapping, and recently, terrorism. We have done so by a measured, well-calibrated, targeted and strategic approach to the challenges, combining the law enforcement and security expertise of the relevant agencies with resource support and management from the private sector, private citizens, associations, religious bodies, the state and local governments and the Security Trust Fund.

And fundamentally, we have not overlooked the judicial end, which is why, as an example, by strong cooperation between the Attorney-General's office and the DSS, we were able to try and convict the terrorists who had conspired to set off multiple and simultaneous IEDs within Lagos, a conspiracy that, if successful, would have changed the course of history for our beloved state.

All of us have, in one way or another, played a key role in the enterprise of safety and security in Lagos State; and sometimes we have had to do so, in the face of perverse efforts to frustrate that enterprise by those who do not wish us well.

Ladies and gentlemen, although we know that you feel the positive impact of our intervention in the maintenance of law and order, we have not stopped there.

Year-on-year, we have accounted to you on our activities and what we have done with your investments. At no stage have you had to wonder just exactly what we had done with your funds, and in no year since 2007 have we failed to render account.

That has been our philosophy and our commitment, and we have never once been found wanting. This is what governance is all about, and I hope you will appreciate the need for continuity in this enterprise.

We have built an example of police funding worthy of emulation, which is underscored by the number of states that have either come to us to assist them in establishing their own response systems, or who have adopted our methods, whether wholly or with modifications that have suited their own needs.

We have never taken your support, indeed your sacrifice, for granted, and we know that, with an increasingly challenging business climate, what with the near collapse of the power system in spite of the self-celebration of the so-called power sector reforms, it is quite a burden. That is why accounting for it is such a commitment.

And we appeal to you not to relent in continuing that support because if we allow any set back, the consequences do not bear thinking about.

The work is not yet finished. There is more to be done. We have started some.

We intend to provide modern patrol vehicles to every Police Division in Lagos and every area command.

This is quite different from what we have given to the Rapid Response Squad and to some of the Divisions.

We intend to undertake prison service reforms by building a 21st century prison and we have completed the design.

We are also developing the investigative capacity of law enforcement through training and support with the aim of providing them with forensic capabilities.

All these initiatives have been carefully and methodically planned, some of them have started, more will start in 2015, and the implementation plan will be handed over to the next government.

As I bid you adieu in my capacity as Governor, rest

assured that as a private citizen I will still be invested in the process. I want to again thank you all for your tireless support and for retaining your trust in us, from the elders, the business leaders, religious leaders, corporations, private associations, social clubs and, especially, all the young school children who have contributed their pocket money to the Fund.

Without you it would have been more difficult to get this far.

Finally, as you prepare to vote in 2015, remember that you will be making choices.

Please also remember that choices have consequences.

When you made the choice to vote for my party and to elect me in 2007 you certainly expected certain things to happen.

One of the many good consequences of that choice is the Security Trust Fund and improved security, safety of lives and property in Lagos.

As you choose, I urge you to choose to keep this model of innovation, resourcefulness, transparency and cosmopolitan law enforcement.

#### EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S REPORT

Distinguished Ladies and Gentlemen,

Let me echo the Chairman's words by warmly welcoming you to the 8th Town Hall Meeting on Security.

s the Chinese say, we live in interesting times, not just in Nigeria, but as recent events have shown, across the globe, with war, epidemics and the effects of climate change stretching mankind almost to the limit of its capacity. But our response to global and local challenges tests the character of a people and measures their spirit of resourcefulness. Our journey over these past eight years has shown what we are capable of when working in lock-step towards a desired outcome, and I am proud you have let me tag along for the ride.

By our sure and steady investments into a visibly functioning security system, by the working collaboration of our security agencies under the direction of his Excellency the Governor, and by the commitment of the men and women of these agencies, we have been able to establish a level of operability that

continues to deter, pursue, kill, capture and prosecute many evil individuals. We acknowledge the fact that we cannot prevent all crimes, but we have significantly narrowed the criminals' windows of opportunity, and those that insist in trespassing on our peace are ultimately rounded up and brought to justice. You will be hearing from the Commissioner of Police and the Director of State Security some of the details.

But, ladies and Gentlemen, let us recap a little and remind ourselves of the nature of our investments over the past eight years; and I want to say that we should focus less on the figures but focus more on their impact, especially in light of the virtually non-existent logistical support from our central government in Abuja for the operations of its security and law enforcement agencies, a sorry situation which has persisted over the years, and which by now everyone should be familiar with.

Since the inception of the formal partnership between the Lagos state government and the citizens, with a nexus point in the operations of the Security Trust Fund, this is what we, that is the state government, the local

governments, the Nigerian Ports Authority, private companies, religious bodies, social and professional associations and private individuals, including school children, have been able to provide across the broad spectrum of needs for the men and women of the relevant services to enable them carry out their constitutional duties:

- 880 patrol, undercover and utility vehicles (all kitted with police radios, and the patrol cars fitted with back cabin, security lights, siren and radio);
- 30 armoured personnel carriers;
- 10 Troop Carriers for the RRS and the Task Force;
- 274 motorbikes;
- 650 sets of protective riders gear (boots, helmets and protective body gear);
- 1765 bullet proof vests;
- 1880 ballistic helmets;
- 1000 AK 47 rifles with 2,000,000 rounds of ammunition;
- 558 walkie-talkies;
- 5 police patrol boats;
- 2 High-power armoured Croq patrol boats for the navy;
- 5046 sets of rain gear (coats and boots;
- 1000 sets of police shooting gloves;
- 1000 pairs of leather boots;
- 5 sets of tactical imagery cameras (thermal nightsight);
- 4 one-kilometer range hand held flood lights (for the navy after attack on Atlas Cove);
- 5 pairs night vision goggles (for navy);
- 2 sets of high-power binoculars (for navy);
- 30 explosive detection kits for the SSS;
- 6320 sets of police uniforms for the RRS;
- 200 baton torches;
- 100 gunshot trauma treatment packs;
- Multiple packs of drugs, injections and clinical equipment for the prisons;
- 12,000 disposable handcuffs:
- 100 stainless steel handcuffs (prisons);
- 500 metal handcuffs for Neigbourhood Watch;
- 10 under vehicle scanners (prisons);
- 1500 sweaters (for RRS);
- 500 stun batons (for NW):
- 20 Garret hand held metal detectors (for the prisons);
- 1690 tires;

- 550 car batteries;
- 6 250, 200, 160, and 60 KVA generators;
- 122 Digital cameras to support the criminal records data base designed by the governor, the attorney general and the commissioner of police;
- 50 units motorised searchlights (RRS);
- 20 units Go-light Military searchlights (RRS);
- 1000 Bunk beds/mattresses/pillows for RRS forward operating base at Oko-Oba;
- Purchase of the building housing Bode Thomas police station on threat of eviction of the police by the landlord.

Now, both the state government and the Trust Fund were deliberate over this period in ensuring that there wasn't an over-emphasis on the procurement side and there was a strong emphasis, within available resources, on ensuring that the various assets, agencies and systems maintain a reasonable level of operability by investments in maintenance, refurbishment, replacement and rehabilitation of equipment; and on targeted distribution of assets based on clear capacity deficits, special needs to deal with specific problems, and identified threats.

Indeed, in line with the changing security terrain, the state government has over the past year invested heavily in technological support, including surveillance and tracking equipment.

The state government has contributed massively to the refurbishment and construction of police stations and area commands, completing earlier in the year a brand new station for Orile Division, and completely rebuilding into a large, modern facility the Area C HQ in Surulere, which, you may recall, was burnt down during a street fight between soldiers and policemen at Ojuelegbe in 2005, and which was commissioned just this Tuesday; and building a further four Area Command HOs which will be commissioned soon. And while we are on this subject, let me state for the record that not a kobo of funding for any of these endeavours has come from the federal government, and indeed not a kobo has been spent by Abuja on the upgrade of any of its police facilities since democracy returned, as against the billions spent by the state government, and yet it is Abuja's responsibility under our constitution. The only exception was the police college which they

were embarrassed into doing. And yet we expect our police men and women to perform to a higher standard. That they achieve what they do is a testament to their patriotism and general sense of duty, and critically the support of all of us.

Recall also the establishment of the command and control center which was conceived by Governor Fashola, started with contributions from your fund and completed and now run by the state government, with growing specialisation.

The state government is responsible for the fuelling of vehicles, the payment of allowances to the security operatives, and the release of funds to support special operations. On fuelling, again nothing, and I mean nothing, comes from the center although they have such a vote head in their yearly budget, just as they supposedly have a vote for maintenance of police stations.

The Fund has been responsible for maintenance of police assets including vehicles, and the repair of critical radio communication masts and replacement of repeaters, at sums which the federal government should be ashamed of not investing in the basic things that would improve the capabilities of its agencies. Remember that I earlier said that it is not about huge sums but the impact of targeted spending that counts most.

The state government and the Fund have also been involved in insurance schemes for men who are injured or died on duty, and also caters for medical care, which again is not provided adequately for by the agencies' principal. We also invest in a reward system for brave officers and those that lost their lives.

In addition to the above we have also invested in publication of security tips and newspaper announcements of behalf of some of the agencies, hosted special interest groups to further explain our mission, and supported youth and citizen enlightenment programs.

Ladies and Gentlemen, it is this input invested by us into the system, under the strategic and tactical direction of the Lagos State Security Council, with the governor as full time Chairman, that has enabled us to create the relative conditions of peace and safety in the state. The threat levels are there, and they are very dynamic as the nation continues to battle the existential threat of terrorism and social disorder, but the capacity to respond to them in a proactive manner has been the focus of this enterprise. And this capacity has come about due to our collective efforts.

As I have stated many times at previous meetings, the Security Trust Fund is a unique type of animal, created by law with its members appointed by His Excellency, Governor Babatunde Fashola, yet largely autonomous in its decision making, while still recognising and keying in to the broad security strategy of the Lagos State Government. Its Board of Trustees is predominantly private sector represented, and its decision making process is business like, open and transparent. To use that oft cited Nigerian cliché, everyone is "carried along". That is why we have operated for over seven years, under the committed leadership of our dear Chairman, Mr. Remi Makanjuola, without any conflict or hint of underhandedness. Our audit process is an article of faith. That you have all attended our yearly meetings in such numbers, representing virtually every sector of our society is, in my respectful view, testament to that reality.

This year, though we did not receive as much as in 2013, we have still been able to make significant contributions to the security machine. Our total cash inflow was N249,000,000 while donations in kind were to the value of N52,900,000. This marks a major reduction of 30% over 2013 receipts, and meant that we had to virtually diminish our reserves to meet some of the critical requests. Thus while cash intake was as stated, expenditure was actually N333,577,000, a 22% increase over 2014. This just reflects the changing landscape that we are confronting now. It also underscores the importance of more people and institutions stepping forward with support.

As I speak to you today, not counting yet to be redeemed pledges, we have exactly N33,000,000 in our account, already committed to requests and grossly insufficient to meet the challenges that the near future portends.

This year, we were able to add 137 brand new vehicles to the security architecture, 100 from the state government to boost RRS operations, and 37 to various police divisions, the state police command HQ, SARS, the SSS and sundry others. But we are far from meeting need. Indeed, the complete lack of input from Abuja makes it an extremely challenging task, but imagine what the situation would have been if we had not, year on year, been adding to or replacing vehicles across the board.

In addition to the 137, the Fund fully rehabilitated 13 vehicles, especially for divisions that did not have a single operating vehicle. We maintained our APCs, and patrol boats and did our cyclical routine maintenance of RRS patrol vans.

In addition to the 100 RRS vans, the state government also provided an additional 150 motorbikes while the fund supported that process by handing over to the state command HQ ten donated motorbikes, and by the purchase of 200 sets of protective riders gear for the special bike squad of the RRS. We bought walkie-talkies, bomb detection kits, tires, uniforms, custom made sweaters and the like. And as usual we provided diesel fuel for the Marine Police and the Navy. The details of

our items of expenditure are in the published report.

Ladies and gentlemen, this is the reality of our situation, and it is only by our continuing efforts that we are able to hold the system together. Every little bit helps and I appeal to you to give till it almost hurts. It is in our collective best interests.

I thank all of you, on behalf of the state government, the fund and the citizens who have benefitted from your generosity. You will hear from the CP what your efforts have enabled the police and other agencies to do. Some of the stories sound more like movie plots, but I assure you they are real, informing us that evil still abounds among us, and that, in line with the theme of today's meeting, we must redouble our efforts to fight this evil; but we are surely winning the battle.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented, unless otherwise stated.

#### (a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements are prepared in compliance with Nigerian Statements of Accounting Standards (SAS). The financial statements are presented in the functional currency, Nigeria Naira (N), and prepared on a modified cash basis under the historical cost convention.

#### (b) Revenue recognition

Donations are recognised when pledges are made. Revenue represents fair value of cash or in-kind donations. Value added tax is not charged on revenue.

Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis using the effective interest method.

#### (c) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are shown at acquisition cost less accumulated depreciation. Acquisition cost represents purchase price plus freight, insurance and handling charges. For assets donated to the Fund, acquisition cost represents fair value of donated Assets.

Repairs and maintenance are charged to the Income and expenditure account during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation is calculated using the straight line method to write down the cost of assets to their residual values over their estimated useful lives, at the following annual rates:

#### (d) Expenses and support to security agencies

Expenses are recognised when incurred. Support to security agencies are in kind donations and they are recognised as expenses when the receiving agency acknowledge receipt of delivery.

#### (e) Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value through the first-in, first-out (FIFO) basis. Cost represents purchase price and other ancillary costs directly associated with the purchase. Net realisable value is the market value less cost to sell.

#### (f) Accounts receivable

Receivables are recognised initially at fair value. Subsequently, they are stated after deduction of specific provision for any pledge considered to be doubtful of recovery. A provision for impairment of receivables is established when a pledge made in a particular year is outstanding up till the time the annual financial statements of that year is about to be signed off and circulated. The amount of the provision is recognised in the Income and expenditure account.

#### (g) Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative figures have been adjusted or extended to conform with changes in presentation in the current year.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### 1. The Fund

The Lagos State Security Trust Fund was established in 2007 by a law of the Lagos State House of Assembly to raise and coordinate the application of donations in cash and equipment which are required to enhance the operational capacity of security agencies operating in the state. The money thus raised is to be used for the acquisition and deployment of security equipment and such human, material and financial resources as shall be found necessary for the effective functioning of all Federal, State and Local Government and other security agencies operating in the State. In addition, part of the fund shall be reserved for the training and retraining of security personnel.

to make the State generally safe for all and sundry. This has led to negation of the phobia.

It will be recalled that on my assumption of office in September 2014, I leveraged on the robust goodwill existing between the Police and the State Government on one hand and members of the public on the other, to record the modest achievements, that have not only consolidated that of my predecessors, but has ensured that the Command keeps the flag flying.

I am happy to inform the house that since my resumption, there has been a gradual reduction in crimes generally especially car snatching, armed robbery, kidnapping et al. This is attributed to strategies emplaced by the Command to check crimes and the worthy collaboration and contributions of Lagos State Government through the Lagos State Security Trust Fund (LSSTF) and Conference 57 in the provision of logistics supports to the Command.

#### INTRODUCTION

agos State with estimated population of eighteen million has thirteen Police Area Commands and one hundred and seven police divisions, making it the biggest police command in the country. The State due to its economic and political importance in the country keeps on attracting migrants and this has made it to have its fair share of security challenges.

Regardless of the phobia for perpetual increase in crime and criminality in the state in view of its peculiar nature, it is delighting to note that the State Government, Police Command, other security agencies and stakeholders have resolved

#### ACHIEVEMENTS RECORDED DURING THE PERIOD UNDER REVIEW

From November, 2013 to October, 2014; a total of four hundred and twenty-three(423) armed robbers were arrested while seventy-three(73) others died during encounters with the police. Three hundred and fifty-eight(358) vehicles were snatched while five hundred and sixty(560) were recovered during the period. Sixty-eight (68) armed robbery incidents were recorded, Three hundred and seventy-two(372) armed robbery attempts were foiled. Regrettably, eight police officers were shot dead in the line of duty. Find below summary of crime statistics and notable achievements recorded during the period under review.

### FOILED BANK ROBBERY/DEATH OF POLICEMEN/ARREST/ DEATH OF ARMED ROBBERS/RECOVERY OF ARMS AND AMMUNITION

Between 20/11/2013 and 06/02/2014 in a follow-up to the case of attempt to rob Access Bank Ayobo branch by armed robbers on 17/11/2013 at about 04300 hours, where three policemen; ASP John Omezea, Sgt Idowu Joshua and Cpl Jerry Gomai attached to Ayobo Division were killed and their rifles taken away, Policemen attached to Special Anti-Robbery Squad(SARS) arrested five members of the gang that participated in the dastardly act, while three others were shot dead during the encounter. Eleven (11) AK-47 rifles No. A05267, 403647, 132969, 5008685, 2064034-3360, 56-2-609299, 56-2-529284, 56-2-5005992, 56-2-61216, 56-2-3280 and 56-2-523929, two (2) K2 rifles NOS. M-39874 and M-40005, one (1) pump action rifle, seventy-six(76) AK-47 magazines, one thousand, five

hundred and sixty (1,560) rounds of 7.62mm calibre live ammunition, a Chevrolet Jeep Reg. No. LH-124-EKY, welding instruments and charms concealed in a blue plastic drum were recovered from them.



#### ARREST OF ARMED ROBBERS/RECOVERY OF ARMS AND AMMUNITION

On 09/01/2014 about 0200 hours, Policemen attached to Special Anti-Robbery Squad (SARS) Ikeja on information, arrested one Samuel Mayagun 'm', aka Asiwaju, 29 years old, leader of a robbery gang that robbed at Murtala Mohammed International Airport, Ikeja on 01/02/2012 and 13/03/2013. The suspect led detectives to arrest four other gang members, named Abiodun Adebayo 'm', 30 years old, Ezekiel Anthony 'm', 26 years old, Ibrahim Sado 'm', 30 years old and Femi Osiyelu 'm' 28 years old in their hideout at Ikorodu where they were planning another robbery operation. One Olatunji Tumboru 'm' the gang's armourer was arrested at ljebu-Ode Ogun State. One General Purpose Machine Gun(GPMG), ten(10) loaded GPMG Magazines, one AK-47 rifle S/No. 56-533124, eight(8) AK-47 magazines, two(2) double barrel shotguns, two hundred and forty(240) rounds of 7.62mm calibre live ammunition and thirty-two(32) live cartridges were recovered in a Volkswagen Space Wagon registration number BDG-155-AX in their hideout at Ikorodu.


On 10/03/2014 about 0300 hours, Policemen attached to Special Anti-Robbery Squad(SARS) Ikeja, acted on information at Ikorodu and arrested a notorious armed

robber, named Olatunbosun Olatunji 'm', 48 years old of no fixed address. The suspect led the Police to arrest a notorious arms dealer one Abdul'azeez Amoo 'm', 45 years old of no fixed address at Ibadan, Oyo State. The Arms dealer confessed that he imported the arms from Mali and Burkina Faso and sold AK-47 rifle at the rate of four hundred and fifty thousand naira (N450,000.00k) each and pistols at two hundred and eighty thousand naira(N 280,000.00k) each. Six(6) AK-47 rifles Nos. UY 472072, 8403662, 1625, 1978MG16939, 026909, 1953CEH6248, Nine(9) AK-47 Magazines and two hundred and seventy(270) 7.62mm calibre live ammunition were recovered from him.



#### ARREST OF ARMED ROBBER/RECOVERY OF STOLEN CARS

On 17/04/14 about 0130 hours, at Ijoko area of Ogun State, Policemen attached to Special Anti-Robbery Squad(SARS), Ikeja in continuation of an investigation of a case of armed robbery, arrested one receiver of stolen/snatched vehicles, Alexander Ilesanmi 'm', 46 years old, an ex-police corporal who paraded himself as an Assistant Commissioner of Police. The suspect was reportedly dismissed from the Nigeria Police Force in 2011 for impersonating an Assistant Superintendent of Police while serving in Ogun State Police Command. One Honda Acura Jeep, Toyota Avalon saloon car, one pair of police uniform with Assistant Commissioner of Police (ACP) accoutrements, one enlarged photograph of the suspect in Deputy Superintendent of Police uniform were recovered in his residence.



#### ARREST OF ARMED ROBBER/RECOVERY OF ARMS

On 09/10/2014, Policemen attached to Special Anti-Robbery Squad (SARS) Ikeja, arrested eight armed robbers; Obinna Onyema 'm', Kitxhito Ofone 'm', Emeka Uche 'm', Bernard Bongy 'm', Chukwuma Akubueze 'm', David Moses 'm', Fabian Ikom 'm' and Ifeanyi Okafor 'm' at Obalende and Kuramo Beach areas of Lagos. Two AK-47 rifles numbers 56-2523999 and 07012990 snatched from Sgt Ogbaide Enbraye and PC Okpetebo Omogrebu attached to PMF 49, Epe on guard duty at New Town Development Area of Lekki Phase II, Ajah were recovered.

#### ARREST OF ARMED ROBBERS/RECOVERY OF ARMS AND ROBBED VEHICLE

On 18/10/2014, at about 0130 hours, Policemen attached to Special Anti-Robbery Squad(SARS) Ikeja in a follow-up to the case of armed robbery and murder of Mr Toyin Obadina, the then Deputy Editor of Daily Newswatch on 01/02/14 by Hypo Junction, along Ijebu-Ode Road, Ikorodu, arrested four of the armed robbers/murderers at Ikorodu area. Two locally made pistols and one Nissan Xterra Jeep with registration number AKD-380-AA robbed from the deceased were recovered from the suspects while police is still on the trail of two other fleeing hoodlums



#### ARREST OF KIDNAPPER/RECOVERY OF ARMS

On 26/10/2014, about 1400 hours, Policemen attached to Special Anti-Robbery Squad (SARS) Ikeja arrested one Anthony Adidi 'm', 33 years old, for the alleged kidnap of one Mrs Ladi Ene Garba, staff of Keystone Bank kidnapped at Eleko area of Lagos Island. Two (2) AK-47 rifles No. 50-24008805 and 07021291 were recovered in an unregistered Volkswagen Passat Saloon Car used by the hoodlums



#### ARREST OF ARMED ROBBERS/RECOVERY OF STOLEN VEHICLES

On 29/10/2014, about 1630 hours, Policemen attached to Special Anti-Robbery Squad (SARS) Ikeja arrested five armed robbers; who specialized in snatching vehicles. They are Mahmud Abdulkareem 'm' 48 years, Musa Yusuf 'm' 27 years, Abayomi Adebayo 'm' 53 years, Israel Nana 'm' 30 years and Moses Andre 'm' 25 years, five Toyota Camry Saloon Cars with registration numbers MUS-861-CA, BQ-652-AKD, MUS-353-CV, BDG-370-CP and AAA-487-CA, one Toyota Avensis Saloon Car with registration number ABJ-89-BK, one Toyota Sienna Bus with registration number FJ-611-LSR, one Toyota Corolla Saloon Car with registration number KUJ-132-HZ, two Honda Accord Saloon Cars with registration number KMM-115-AA and LSD-394-BG, one Nissan Pathfinder Jeep with registration number AGB-839-RK, one Nissan Murano Jeep with registration number KRK-449-CL and two Mitsubushi Outlander Jeeps with registration number KTU-615-AV and KJA-745-BH, tools for changing engine and chassis numbers and samples of fabricated chassis numbers were recovered from the suspects.



It is however, pertinent to note that as other crimes were being brought down, there is marginal increase in murder cases. Most of the cases arose from cultism and cult related clashes, especially in Mushin, Yaba, Surulere, Bariga, Shomolu and Ikorodu areas of the state. The reason for this is not far-fetched; which is majorly complete disregard for the sanctity of human lives by individuals. Other reasons for the high cases of murder are:

- Street Gangsterism and Rivalry: Youths of these areas have formed themselves into various groups and gangs for social and sometimes criminal activities. Supremacy and egocentric issues amongst them usually arose and sometimes lead to gory end.
- ii. Motor Transport Unionism: It is a trite knowledge that inter and intra leadership tussle, collection of levies, ownership of parks etc between members of the National Union of Road Transport Workers (NURTW) and Road Transport Employers Association of Nigeria(RTEAN), some under the guise of being Area Boys always lead to bloody fight or confrontation and loss of lives of their members and innocent citizens
- iii. Thuggery: Due to morale decadence in the society and abdication of parental duties, many youths have become street urchins (area boys) fending for themselves from tender age. To make ends meet,

they are ready tools for engagement as thugs. They did not grow up to have value for life and property. On slight provocation and/or paltry sum, they are ready to kill.

- iv. Youthful Exuberance: Gangsterism and rivalry fights between youths are sometimes done due to youthful exuberance and urge to exhibit strength and dexterity. Many of these youths on realizing their folly sometimes get sober and regret their actions, which may be too late.
- Unemployment: Some of the unemployed youths have taken to violence to survive. Many have been arrested for robbery, kidnapping and murder cases.
- vi. Politics: It is a known fact that while approaching electioneering period; politically induced/motivated violent crimes are usually on the increase. Unscrupulous politicians recruit willing hands to carryout dirty deals and also, provide platforms for criminals to parade themselves as politicians.

All must be admonished to hold life of human being as sacrosanct as prescribed by God and the Constitution of the country.

#### STRATEGIES EMPLACED TO FIGHT CRIME

To stem this ugly tide, increased police presence in the indicated areas and other locations are being implemented. The Command is not only proactive in nature but intelligence-driven. Other strategies emplaced are:

- Re-invigoration or re-stimulation of the intelligence gathering mechanism of the state and information sharing among security agencies;
- Purposeful and constant joint raids with personnel of the Military and DSS of identified criminal hideouts and black spots;
- Aerial patrols by helicopters using the two multipurpose helicopters acquired for the Command by the Lagos State Government;

- Training and retraining of the officers on Human Rights, Election duty, emergency response and combat operation readiness;
- Use of Police information boxes strategically located at various points in the state/the maintenance of a robust outfit for intelligence gathering;
- vi. Deployment of Counter Terrorism Unit and Bomb Squad personnel at key locations;
- vii. Dissemination of the telephone numbers of the Area Commanders, Divisional Police Officers and other Principal Officers to the members of the public to enhance information flow to the police;
- viii. In conjunction with the State Government members of the NURTW and RTEAN have been made to understand that forceful taking over of motor parks will no longer be tolerated, except in line with the constitution of the unions. Where such occurs, the aggressors are promptly dislodged by the Command and advised to follow the due process;
- ix. Upon intelligence of an imminent breach of public peace, the Command constantly dialogues and encourages dialogue among warring groups;
- Prompt investigation and prosecution of all reported cases;
- xi. Maintenance of robust working relationship with the military and other security agencies;
- xii. The government should on its part, sensitize the citizenry, that human life is sacrosanct.

#### CHALLENGES/CONSTRAINTS:

However, despite the massive contributions of the LSSTF to the Command, dearth of patrol vehicles remains a great challenge. Many vehicles attached to the divisions have become rickety and unserviceable due to old age and over usage.

Another challenge is the frequent breakdown of the Command's communication system, thus, hindering

operations and anti-crime activities. Currently, the Command has two repeaters bases situated at NITEL building Marina and Alausa. The one at Marina is too old, develops faults at random and makes radio communication extremely difficult.

Lack of modern laboratory needed to assist in investigation of cases in line with modern scientific trend world-over is hampering investigation and conviction of criminals. The Command still relies on archaic traditional methods of investigation which the criminals have learnt how to beat with ease and it is not in tandem with modern day policing and prosecution of offenders.

Also of great concern is the issue of fuelling of the patrol vehicles. Except for the Marine Section whose boats are fuelled by the LSSTF, all the divisional patrol vehicles are being fuelled by the respective Divisional Police Officers at a great constraint to them.

#### **NEEDS/WAY FORWARD**

As a remedy, the following are the urgent logistics need of the Command:-

#### COMMUNICATION:

- Three (3) Motorola MTR2000 Repeaters, 100w heavy duty mood with cooling system
- Three (3) 9DB gain heavy duty Omni-directional Antenna for MTR2000 repeater
- Three (3) 100m Heliax low loss cable
- One (1) 3db gain Antenna for the existing base station in Maroko Police Station
- Four (4) 1.5 KVA Inverter (Maroko and Marina)
- Eight (8) 200mAH Heavy duty Lead Alkaline battery (Maroko, Marina and 2 other new repeaters)
- Three (3) 'U' Bracket for Antenna Installation
- viii. Three (3) Installation (turning and Programming)
- Four Thousand (4,000) walkie-talkies;

- One hundred and fifty (150) Base Sets;
- xi. Four (4) new repeaters, each with 60KVA generator and back-up batteries

#### B. PATROL VEHICLES/MOTORCYCLES:

- 200 patrol vehicles, equipped with communication i. gadgets:
- 5 lorries (troop carriers);
- iii. 5 heavy duty towing vehicles.
- Establishment of Multi-purpose modern Forensic Laboratory

Other logistics requirements include arms and ammunition, riot gunners, smoke pistols, hand grenades, tear gas canister, thunder blasts, bullet proof vests, ballistic helmets, respirators, rain coats/boots, crash/steel helmets, riders' gears, torchlights/rechargeable lamps; cones, et al.

#### CONCLUSION

The officers and men of Lagos State Police Command wish to express profound gratitude and appreciation to His Excellency, the Executive Governor of Lagos State, Mr. Babatunde Raji Fashola(SAN), the Lagos State Security Trust Fund(LSSTF) and the good people of Lagos State, for the provision of the enabling environment and requisite tools to fight crime and criminality in Lagos State; a gesture that has made Lagos State Police Command a model for other State Commands in the country to emulate.

The Command will not relent in its efforts to consolidate on the achievements so far recorded and will most highly appreciate if these critical crime fighting equipments are provided to enable it improve on the successes so far recorded in its dogged fight against crime and criminality.

## REPORT ON THE ACTIVITIES OF OP MESA. A JOINT MILITARY - ARMY, NAVY, AND AIR FORCE SPECIAL SECURITY OUTFIT







#### Introduction

OP MESA is a military security outfit which provides support for civil security agencies, especially the police, in the discharge of their statutory responsibilities. OP MESA comprises officers and men of the Army, the Navy and the Air Force under the command of Brig. A. Lubo, Commander 9 Brigade, Navy Commodore T.D. Ikoli, Commander, NNS Beecroft and Air Commodore A. L. Osanyintolu, Commander Air Force 435 Base. The military are currently involved in internal security operations aimed at maintaining law and order in 27 States of the federation in line with the provisions of Section 217 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic

of Nigeria 1999. OP MESA's primary responsibility is anticrime patrols although they participate in joint raids of identified Black Spots with other agencies such as the police and SSS and in responding to distress calls.

#### **Mode of Operations**

OP MESA operates a 24 hour daily mobile and static patrols in their predetermined areas of operation which also in clude public infrastructure.

Navy Agege, Apapa, Ijora, Ajegunle and some areas of Mile 2 and Oil pipelines and tank farms in Lagos State

Air Force - Ikeja, Mushin, Isolo, Apapa Ijaye, Oshodi, and Alimosho including Ikotun, Egbeda, Shasha and its environs

#### The Strength/Capacity

Army 15 officers, 150 soldiers and 20 patrol vehicles Air Force 12 officer, 120 men and 9 patrol vehicles. Navy 8 officers, 40 men and 11 Vehicles

#### **Effectiveness OP MESA**

OP MESA has continued to provide assistance to the police in the enforcement of law and order especially carrying out daily patrols, responding to distress calls/civil disturbance and participation in joint raids of "black spots" where over 1.176 arrests were made.

OP MESA also responds alongside the police to distress calls and have assisted in foiling robberies, and arrest of armed robbery suspects.



The State Security Council, Chaired by His Excellency the Governor Coordinates the activities of OP MESA while the state government and the Lagos State Security Trust Fund provide the required operational equipment/assets and logistics for the outfit. The Council ensures that the three arms of OP MESA function as a unit to ensure the effectiveness of the outfit.

#### Areas of responsibility

Army Ikoyi, Mile 2, Badagry, Ikeja, Ogba, Ojo, Ikorodu, Mile 12, Ajah, Lagos Island, Idi-Araba, Agbara and Oil pipelines in the state.

#### Challenges/Requirements

As is usual with such security agencies, OP MESA requires constant maintenance, replacement and even expansion of its assets. Currently most of the vehicles in use by OP MESA are on their last legs and require change in 2015. Also there is need to expand the operations of OP MESA as a proactive action in view of the recent threat of terrorism.

OP MESA is an important component of security in Lagos State and it is critical to properly equip it for improved efficiency.
